





After concentrating on the subject of microminis for some time now, I feel a change is in order. So I plan to show some bottles that I consider to be "treasures of the past."

The three bottles featured this time are all pre-prohibition.

An interesting story accompanies the first bottle, the one I feel is the most outstanding of the three. While my wife and I were attending a local bottle show, she excitedly called me over to show me this Old J.H. Cutter sitting on a vendor's table full of dust. Needless to say, I could have fainted when I saw the bottle and when I saw the price of 50¢, I did. After purchasing the bottle, I asked the friendly gentleman where he found it. It had come from a room of an old, condemned hotel

The rear label reads "Compliments of Michael Sullivan, 10 High Street,

Nashua, NH." The clear glass bottle has a manila colored label with black letters. A signature on the bottom states P. Moorman & Co., Louisville, Kentucky.


The second bottle is made of dark green glass, also with a manila label. The black circle in the center contains gold writing, barely visible in the photograph. It is a Schenley Pure Rye Whiskey of the Schenley Distilling Co.

The last featured is a dark amber glass bottle. It, too, has a manila label with black script writing. It is a Fred Harvey Rye and states in the center that "this whiskey has been carefully selected, aged in the wood, and bottled under our direct supervision." Iunderstand "Fred Harvey" was a restaurant chain in the '30's and obviously before since the bottle is pre-prohibition.

I have six bottles to describe and for you to look at, so I won't waste time and writing. There are three vodkas and three brandies from foreign lands. The first bottle is a French Brandy Armagnac 3 3/8" (8.6 cm) tall and made of dark green glass. The bottle is round with an indentation at the base and the neck is slanted to the right. Embossed on the back at the base are the words "Armagnac Saint Vivant" while on the bottom of the bottle it reads. "Made in France Modele Depose." I cannot read French, but would guess the contents at about  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  oz. This bottle also comes in a slightly larger size and may be found throughout the Orient and Europe.

The next two bottles are interesting and different in that they are plastic. Both bottles were produced and bought in Australia. The first is Remy Martin Brandy, bottled by Nathan & Wyeth Pty. Ltd., Melbourne, Sidney, and

The next three are flask type bottles. The first, a plain looking glass flask from Yugoslavia contains Plum Brandy from the Badel Co. The bottle is slightly oval in shape, 4 1/8" (10.5 cm) tall, 80 proof, and contains about 1 1/2 ozs. (This is my guess.) The last two are products of Australia again. Both contain Vodka by Robka. The center bottle




This is the beginning of a series of articles that I hope my fellow mini glass collectors will enjoy.

Most of the California whiskies and bourbons pictured have been acquired over the last several years in individual purchases or from collections. As most of the whiskey and bourbon collectors know, California was not the most productive state for minis, despite its population.

The first two bottles are from the S.E. Rykoff Co. This company was started in 1911 and today is the seventy-seventh largest industrial company in California. They are food service specialists for restaurants and institutions.

The first bottle is 100 proof, Fillmore Straight Whiskey. This red and yellow label shows a picture of President Fillmore. The banner reads "Arbiter" and "Elegantine." This bottle contains one year old bourbon that

was distilled in Pennsylvania. The California tax stamp is dated August 6. 1936.

The second bottle from this company is in a brown glass bottle with a black plastic top. The bottle appears to have been made for some other purpose. The contents are Duquesne Club Straight Bourbon Whiskey (100 proof). The back label says "Distilled from cereal grain in the Spring of 1934." The bottle has a beautiful embossed gold label with green lettering.

The next two bottles are from the Owl Drug Company of Los Angeles, Calif. Many bottle collectors who dig for old bottles are familiar with the embossed pre-prohibition bottles from this company.

The Old Royalty brand is 80 proof,

Straight Bourbon Whiskey. The label is done in red, white, and black. The back of the bottle has an orange and white paper California tax stamp. These two ounce - two cent number tax stamps were issued right after prohibition. This one is dated Nov. 7, 1935. These tax stamps were replaced by the orange decal tax stamps as shown on the Fillmore Whiskey.

The last bottle was also bottled for the Owl Drug Company. It is 90 proof Blended Whiskey of the Copley Club Brand. This label is red, white, and black. A California decal tax stamp (Nov. 30, 1935) is on the back.

I will try in future articles to show you some bottles from local Los Angeles area stores and from Northern California. Good bottle hunting.





# MINIATURE BEERS

This is my third article and once again very pleased to be sharing with you pictures and information on your and my favorite hobby, Miniature Beers and Go-Withs. However, before I get started, I'dlike to extend my "thanks" to Scott Spaid for his past help with the beer article. Also I'd like to tell his father how much I like the new size of MBC. How about you? Let's all get behind him, OK. (Ed. note: unsolicited, honestly, folks.) Sorry for missing an issue. As you heard, my pictures just didn't turn out. (Oh, well!)

Thought I might get started by showing you the beers by the alphabet. Picture #1 is the Arrow Beer, medium or 4" with a foil label "Imperial Lagered" by the Globe Brewing Co., of Baltimore Maryland.

Picture #2 shows two A-1's medium or 4". One has a red foil label, the other has a white decal label. Both of these are by the Arizona Brewing Co. of Phoenix, Arizona.

Picture #3 shows three of the Acme beers. A very colorful label on them all, which you have to agree. The first is the medium of 4" with a paper label by Acme Breweries, San Francisco, Calif. The next two are tall or 4 1/4" with the first having a paper label from the same Acme Breweries while the second is an Acme Lager with a decal label by California Brewing of San Francisco.

I will wait until next issue to show the stubbies, since there are several of them. By that time I hope to have my collection that's in boxes in Dayton here with me in Olympia, Wash. I might be able to take some more pictures.

The rest of this article I would like to take the time to answer some questions the best I can. I had a letter from a newer collector in Pennsylvania, but after writing him, I discovered I didn't have his address. Sorry!

So now let's talk about when miniature beers were first made. From what I know, they started in and around the late 1800's and early 1900's. Of course these were pre-prohibition beers with





blob tops. Most of the time these had cork stoppers which were later replaced with metal caps. These bottles were embossed sometimes with the name of the brewery, others had embossing on one side and paper labels on the other side. I'll talk more about these early beers in a future M. B. C. when I've got the pictures to show.

Around 1933, the Muth Company of Buffalo, New York, came on the scene making miniature beers for advertising purposes. Then a little later came Bill's Specialty Manufacturing Co. from Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Ithink we know Bill's a little better since they did make several novelty and specialty beers. Most of these I find very difficult to locate. However, we all do collect these and are proud to display them with our collections.

These beers came in the following sizes: 4 1/4, 4, 3 1/4, and 3 inches. They were also called tall, medium, tall stubby, and stubby. They come in paper, foil and decal labels with salt and pepper caps or solid caps and do

not contain beer.

There was also another company by the name of Owens-Illinois which made the Pabst bottles and possibly others. The latest now comes from Taiwan and these are poorly made. But...we all collect them (sometimes they're all you can find so you're glad to get them) as later on that's all there may be.

There is much to be said about Miniature Beers and their Go-Withs. I enjoy collecting the wooden beer openers, steins, mugs, cans, chalk back bar pieces, etc. as much as anything.

By the way, I hear there's a Miniature Beer Book once again in the making. Wouldn't that be great for all of us collectors? We will keep our fingers crossed. Once again I would be pleased to hear from any of you out there with your ideas, pictures, and information. Keep in mind this is your article as well as mine. Birds, birds, birds. Throughout the years, a great many companies have come out with ceramic bird bottles. In the past even Hoffman Originals itself has issued several outstanding pieces. Now however, Hoffman is going to release a set of six miniature birds which are going to be marketed as no miniatures have been previously in the U.S. The set is called The Song Birds and each of the six has a two ounce capacity. They will be available wherever miniatures are sold and that should include the markets where they may be filled with non-alcoholic contents.

The great point of interest about these pieces though is that they are not only bottles but coaster sets. If you'd wondered what those wooden bases were, be in doubt no longer. The bird bottle is permanently attached to the coaster set. Certainly to a great many people this will be much more important than a music box. And, think what great gifts they'll make for your non-collecting friends (which is always a marvelous way to get a new collector interested).

Along with these little birds, you can finally expect the set of six horses and the miniature panda with cub. Many other bottles will have larger than 2 oz. capacities so would not be considered true miniatures by some; however, variety is still the spice of life and you'll definitely want to take a look at some of these bottles before you make your final decisions!













### RIGINALS

Decanters



When you visit Europe and you like to collect miniature liquor bottles, you will find that many countries have very special kinds of whisky. Let's take a look at some most interesting ones.

A few issues back, Ada Felske wrote about the strangely-named whisky from Wales, Swn y don. This bottle was brought back to me here in Germany by a friend who visited Wales. If you remember her article, she pictured the ceramic jug.

Going from Wales to Belgium, we find two whiskies. First is the Old Mackay in a nice small bottle. It's Belgian Whisky made with Scottish malt and neutral domestic spirits. It's prepared and bottled by the de Beukelaer from Antwerp which today makes liqueurs and sweets. The other whisky is Montlee. This is also a blend using the pure malt and neutral spirits. It is prepared and bottled in Chassart, Belgium. The label states that it is the finest blended whisky and shows a romantic hill picture.

In Eastern Europe, they also like whisky. The Kord Distillery in Czechoslovakia made the blended Kord whisky. It's a four year old and on the back label you can read: "Quality and taste of Whisky is the business of our distillery." (I don't know the taste!!)

In Italy you can find many Italian whiskies. The Redil Whisky is a blend with Italian spirits and Scotch Whisky as is also the George Denis. The age of this second whisky is not very high as the color is clear like water.

We go now all the way up to the Netherlands for two seldom seen bottles. The first is called Tops. It is a total product of the Netherlands and is made by Tops Ltd. The other whisky is also of an unknown age by the producer, Jansen Ltd., was established in 1777; hence this is Whisky 1777.

From the Netherlands, a quick stop in West Berlin. There the Savoy Distillery makes its Savoy Whisky. It's a blend with many Scotch malt whiskies and some German grain whisky. The label is very attractive with the old cloth on the top and a very red seal.

Finally we come to some Scotch bottles which you don't find in Scotland. Double Point is a Scotch whisky from the McLintoch Ltd. distillery, but it



is bottled in Germany. The James 007 comes from Glasgow but is imported and bottled only for Austria. The last Scotch is called Scotty. The sole distributor for Germany is the Sporn Ltd. company of Hamburg. On the label is no mention of the distillery.

I hope you've enjoyed this short European tour of whiskies. --F.N.G.--




This is the next in my series on "different" bottles which will be described from time to time. I am continuing the article I started in the last issue on "cannons."


The first one is a really nice piece of work, in great detail, color and proportion. The bottle is a frosted glass flat type of 30 ml in capacity and contains Marquis de Montesquiou. The gun carriage is of molded plastic in an antique bronze looking color. On the front of the carriage is a round shield with the Montesquiou logo while on the rear of the carriage is a small brass type plate with the name "Marquis de Montesquiou Armagnac." The wheels turn; however, the "cannon" carriage does not tilt. The dimensions of the piece are: 5 1/2" in length, 3 1/4" wide, and 3 1/8" tall. This is an exceptionally fine piece of work and one of my favorites.


The next is both quite imposing in size and design. A bottle of Napoleon Brandy in dark green glass containing 45 ml of Ducauze. The carriage, would you believe, is all hardwood, possibly teak or mahagony. The wheels are made to turn and the cannon tilts up and down. There is a copper foil band around the rims of the wheels and the hubs and the knob on the breech of the cannon are turned brass. This cannon is 6 3/8" long, 4" wide, and 3 1/4" tall. There is a name plate in brass hanging on a chain from the neck of the carriage with the name Napoleon in black letters and a red letter "N" in a laurel wreath. On the rear of the carriage is the same place and logo. All in all, a nice piece to have in any col-











My third "cannon" is different from any that I have described previously. This is true because of the design and the fact it is of all metal construction. The bottle is from the Marquis de Vibrac and is a flat frosted glass. It contains 30 ml of Armagnac Napoleon. This very unique piece is of brass plated wire and metal framework. The spokes of the wheels look like they have been brazed or welded to the rim of the wheels (which do turn) while the cannon does not tilt. The rear of the carriage has the usual identification name plate as all the previous pieces described. This one is 5 1/8" in length, 3 3/8" wide and 3 3/8" tall...and to

repeat, a nice piece of work and welcome in any collection.

The last to be pictured is the Courvoisier "cannon." The bottle is dark green glass and contains 1 oz. Courvoisier VSOP Cognac. The gun carriage wheels and stand are all plastic but antique brass in color. The front of the carriage has the word "Courvoisier" embossed in it. The wheels turn but the "gun" does not tilt. This gun is 4 1/2" long, 3 1/8" wide and 2 3/4" tall. Incidentally, this piece, along with the Camus cannon previously described, came from the collection of our editor.

It is glass, similar to frosted bottles, but not exactly frosted. It contains Oyzo (Ouzo?) and is 4 1/2 inches tall. One side depicts the Goddess Athena and the other side depicts the Olympian Zeus. Bottle number two is from the Southern Sales Comp any of Miami, Florida. The only way I can describe this item is to say that it is in the shape of an umbrella, It's plastic, 43/4" tall, con-

The next bottle is also from Manhattan. Anybody drooling out there in mini world? I drooled when I first saw the following. It is the famous Manhattan Fan Lady (or so I was told). I have only seen two or three others since I've been in this hobby. She's 2 1/2 inches tall, gold plated, but carries no labels.

The fourth item is also from the Manhattan company. This is their famous lamp with shade and three cordial micro bottles under the shade. When you pull on the gold plated chain, the little tray comes down and the three cordials are exposed. I cannot dive you any more information on the lamp because it's gone already. I had to recoup some of the money for the 500 mini collection I bought which I mentioned


