Here's hoping this is the beginning of a healthy and prosperous New Year!

I'd like to start off the New Year by featuring four pre-prohibition jugs which I'm sure are not new to most of you but, however, are not easy to come by.

All four pottery jugs pictured are of oatmeal color. Blue paint lettering is stencilled under a glaze.

The first jug is from the N. M. Uri Co., of Louisville, Kentucky. It contained hand-made, international sour mash. This jug's uniqueness lies in its wooden handle and wire bail, whereas most other jugs have one or two ceramic handles. It is unusual to find this

type of jug with handle and bail intact. Next is an Old Mell-Sale Rye, Pure

Whiskey. No other info here.

The third jug reads West Baden Springs, Indiana, 1902. Perhaps it contained either whiskey (obvious for the first two jugs), vinegar, cider, etc. - some of the contents often given in items of this sort during this period of time.

Last is a Jones Bros. and Co., Blue Grass Belle - Vinegar, of Louisville, Kentucky. Although quite desireable in its own right, not as much as the first two.

These jugs range from 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 inches tall.





DAVID & VENUS

Coming this spring from S & S Imports in San Pedro, California, is the pair of magnificent ceramics seen on this page for the first time ever. The two pieces should certainly look familiar to you as they're representations of the famous Michelangelo's David

and Botticelli's Venus.

This pair was created in pure white porcelain in a very limited edition of only 600 sets. These "art" pieces will be available shortly and look for them to go quickly.

The set of six bottles pictured here (and three of which are also seen on the cover) are a most beautiful, well-designed, and (it would seem) expensive set to have in your collection.


The bottles were discovered in only two or three places in travels through Japan, yet 6000 of each piece were made. Produced by two or more ceramic companies, the bottles were issued by the Eishogen Company and contain sake.

They were made to commemorate the signing of the Sino-Japanese Peace Treaty in 1979. The pieces were recreated from illustrations of Chinese snuff bottles taken from the book The Collectors Book of Snuff Bottles by Bob C. Stevens.

At the International Chinese Snuff Bottle Society Convention in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, this past October, a most remarkable thing happened. On the night of October 19, 1979, one set of six bottles was put up for auction. A collector from Connecticut, Mr. Janos Szekeres, made the winning bid of \$850,00!!

KOBY'S Kollectable Kolumn by Bob Koby

Starting with this issue, I've decided not to go into describing the shape, height, and such of the minis I'll be showing. Instead I will endeavor to show more pictures of bottles.

Bottle number one should be of interest to figural collectors who are always looking for those hard to find Manhattan or any other American figurals. This one is or was made by Southern Sales but from reading past issues of club papers and Snyder's books, I'm sure the same company made this Cherry Branch for Manhattan.

Bottle number two is Lejon Brandy. Since I began to submit material to M. B. C., I've always shown figurals, rare straights or current unusual minis. Little attention has been given to the other brands of drinks in this hobby. Bottle number three is Hartley Brandy, five years old. It was produced and bottled by Shewan Jones Inc., Lodi, California, and distributed by National Distillers Products.

Number four is College Inn Cherry Flavored Brandy. Made and bottled by College Inn Wine and Spirits Division Food Products of College Inn, Chicago, Illinois, this is a most unusual bottle. Just to mention a few other minis from this company, I have The Four Georges Triple Sec, The Four Georges Creme de Cacao, Creme de Menthe (metal twist cap, clear, square with sloping sides) and a Creme de Menthe in a different shape (clear, tear drop shape).

Number five is a Kopke Brandy, product of Portugal by Dundalk Liqueur of Baltimore, Maryland...the bottler and distributor. Number six is E. Martin ten year old Brandy, Popper Morson was the importer and the bottle is also a product of Portugal. It has a 7 1/2¢ Florida gold tax stamp vintage 1949-52.



Number seven is a Golden Wedding Blended Whiskey, Number eight is another version of the G & W Blended Whiskey. I'm showing these two because in all my travels and in seeing so many collections, I've never seen the above two in anyone's collection.

To begin 1980 (and I hope it will be a great year for you mini-wise), I'm showing two more Southern Sales minis. I'll not describe the basket but will mention that both are Chianti cordials. One label is green and one is red.

HE COLLECTOR: Frank Gerlach

To meet with our collector this time, we journey to Cologne, Germany, to see Frank Gerlach and his collection. Many of the foreign whiskies previously seen in these pages came from Frank and you'll also remember the articles he has written for all of us. So, let's listen to what he has to say:

"On December 1st I was 29 years old, am married, and have two little girls (3 months and 20 months). By profession I am a policeman in Cologne and am now in a special branch of the Criminal Investigation Department. I am a Chief Inspector in the Identification Department. But when I am at my home, I spend a good deal of time with my miniature whiskies.

"For five years now I've collected whisk(e)y miniatures from all over the world. At this time I have 646 different brands, not counting brands with different labels, another proof, or a different shaped bottle. I am a most proud owner of some very rare and old bottles from Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium, and Scotland. All of these are whisky.

"It all began with the birthday of a colleague. I bought 25 different miniatures and saw some very nice whisky minis. So Ithought to myself, it's better to collect some bottles than to give them away. That began my looking, searching, and buying. It's not very easy in Germany to collect miniatures.



in fact, it's avery rare hobby. My collecting friends all live in foreign countries: USA, Scotland, Italy, and Japan.


"It's also not very easy to have this hobby with my family. My brothers and friends are always saying that they want to come and drink all the closed bottles. So I must always have larger whisky bottles on hand for drinking.

"I do have two friends in the nearby area who now also collect whisky miniatures. At first I thought my collection was very big. Many newspapers have written about my hobby, but when I

read the MBC and saw the other collectors, particularly in the U.S. or my friend in Glasgow, I must say that my collection is very small. But I think I have many excellent bottles because some of these rare bottles my friends in other countries can never buy.

"So, at last I say that I am most happy to have contact with other collectors through the MBC!"

(Ed. note: Take a good look at some of those brand names in the photos and you'll certainly have to agree that Frank has some magnificent bottles!)



Many articles have been written about the merchandising of miniature liquor bottles, and I feel that the accompanying photo of three miniature Canadian Club Whisky bottles, which were sold for the festive Christmas season in our British Columbia liquor stores at a retail price of \$3.70 plus tax, is a real winner for Hiram Walker and Sons Limited Distillery of Walkerville, Canada. It's a wonderful stocking stuffer.

The plastic 1 1/2 inch diameter tube containing the three bottles is 15 in. tall (or long) and the white heavy plastic handle is another few inches taller making it 17 3/8 inches in overall length. There is a plastic base insert on the bottom of the tube, and they will free stand on the base. There is a red ribbon with about five turns around the tube, Starting at the base, and curling

around it to the start of the handle, there are six stars embossed on both sides of the curve of the handle.

They were brought in to our city liquor outlets by a good friend of mine, and of the mini collectors here on Vancouver Island, Mr. Max G. Abbott, the District Manager for Hiram Walker -Gooderham & Worts Distilleries, I tookthispicture with my Pronto Polaroid camera and am sorry the clarity is not as good as it could be; however, I wanted to share this with all the MBC readers. There aren't the stories to write about minis here in British Columbia due to our past antiquated liquor laws, but they are now improving somewhat. Maybe, just maybe, there will be other stories and photos to follow this one from up here! -- L. K. --



The SCREECH Story

Long before any liquor board was created to take alcohol under its benevolent wing, the Jamaican rum which was eventually to be known as Screech was a mainstay of the Newfoundland diet. Salt fish was shipped to the West Indies in exchange for rum; the fish became the national dish of Jamaicans and the rum

became the traditional drink of Newfoundlanders.

Not being overly concerned with alcohol content, the early fishermen tended to drink the rum at incredibly high strength with no attempt made to temper the taste. When the government took control of the liquor business in the early 20th century they put the rum in a very sophisticated unlabelled bottle, but fortunately did not alter the rum itself. This delightful product might have continued indefinitely as a nameless rum except for the influx of American servicemen to the island during World War II.

As the story goes, the commanding officer of the first detachment was taking advantage of Newfoundland hospitality for the first time and was offered a drop of rum as an after dinner drink. Seeing his host toss back the liquid with nary a quiver, the unsuspecting American adhered to local custom and downed the drink in one

gulp.

The look of shock and the glorious shades of color on the American's face were overshadowed by the bloodcurdling howl made by the poor fellow as soon as he managed to regain his breath. Sympathetic persons from miles around rushed to the house to assist the poor creature in such obvious agony and of course to satisfy their curiousity as to what was going on. Among the first to arrive was a garrulous old American sergeant who pounded on the door and demanded "What the cripes was that ungodly screech?"

The taciturn Newf who had answered the door replied simply, "The screech?

'Tis the rum, me son.''

Thus was born a legend. As word of the incident was passed around, the soldiers determined to try this mysterious "screech" and finding its effects as devastating as the name implies, adopted it as their favorite.


The opportunistic liquor board immediately pounced on this name and reputation and began labelling Newfoundland Screech. While having to tone down the alcohol content slightly in deference to a less robust clientele, the liquor board has allowed Screech to retain its character and the product is as impressive as ever, especially to the uninitiated.



The newest issue from McCormick Distilling Company of Weston, Missouri, is this Pony Express rider. This one sort of "snuck" out before most collectors were even aware of it and it's disappeared in a number of areas where it first hit. Unfortunately since the train wasn't able to be released, this is a nice bonus for us from the McCormick Company.



VODKA



INMINIATURE

by Jim Triffon

This author returns with the "What's New" articles after an absence of three months or so. This was due to serious illness of a member of my family and frustrating problems of my camera and photographic techniques. Hopefully these are behind me and I can get on with an informative and picturesque column for you.

I have pictured for this return article, eight vodkas from seven countries. In the first group of four, we begin with Puschkin. This crystal clear 80 proof bottle is 4 3/4" (12.1 cm) tall with the top third tapered in and slightly dimpled. The label is predominantly blue in color, outlined in silver. This is a German product exported to Japan and contains 40 ml of vodka.

Next is the Suntory-mild vodka from Japan also. This is a 70 proof with a 50 ml capacity. The bottle is rectangular in shape with the sides embossed with a reedlike pattern. It is 4 3/8" or 11.2 cm tall. Both these bottles were purchased in Tokyo on a recent trip.

The third bottle is of domestic origin...Los Angeles, CA and Bardstown, KY. Royal Gate is a product of Haas Brothers in San Francisco and it is believed that the bottle was sold only in Reno, Nevada, for a short time in 1979. It is 1/10 pt., 80 proof, the standard round shape of most of our bottles, and is 4 9 16" or 11.7 cm tall. The label is very striking and colorful...multi-colored and outlined in a gold border.

Next is a vodka from Greece called Omega from Lucas D. Tsotras Co. of Piraeus. Greece. What makes this unusual is the shape which is octagonal, tapering in to a slender, round neck. The bottle is 4 5/8" (11.8 cm) tall with



a multi-colored, but distinctively designed label. The capacity and proof are undetermined.

The next group starts with the domestic vodka Samovar. A Schenley product, it is 1/10 pt., 4 1/2" (11.5cm tall, and clear glass. The label is red, white, and blue with a silver border and outline of the "Iron Cross." This bottle has a web-like streak of white paint on the outside which is difficult to make out in the photo.

Next is a bottle imported from the United Kingdom into the United States, Imported and bottled by Kulov Distillers Company of Philadelphia, this bottle is Kulov by name, 80 proof, unknown capacity, and 4 3/4" (12.1 cm) tall. The label is a foil-like multi-colored design and shape, very handsome and distinctive with the lettering outlined in shiny gold. At the very bottom of

the label in very small letters are the words "The Crown Jewel Vodka."

Following this is Wiser's International Vodka from Belleville, Ontario, Canada. This is 80 proof, 1.6 fl. oz. (45 ml), and 4 5/8" (11.8 cm) tall. The bottle is square in shape with a round slender neck. The label is plain, but nice looking in color and lettering, principally red with gold outline.

Last, but certainly not least, is a bottle from Greenland, produced in Denmark. The contents are 80 proof, 50 ml (1.7 fl. oz.), 100% grain neutral Spirits Co. A'S - Copenhagen, Denmark. By name, Sermeq Vodka, made with genuine 1000 year old glacial ice. This is a standard round, clear bottle, 4 3/4" (12.1 cm) tall with a very nice looking label in various shades of blue and silver.

How'd you like that report last time from Gary Shuster? Several people have written us a little thanks for it, but the thanks really must go to Gary who compiled all the info.

Want to make a correction now on something we ran a while back. That excellent shop in London, Bourbon Liquors, will not ship anywhere. This comes from a collector in England, John Lovett, who tells me that he buys there quite frequently.

The original list of bottles from that shop came from Mike Weingart of Houston and Mike has come through with more info...here goes:

"Another Memo from Mike. Just got back from Florida with about 30 more bottles for my collection. In Tampa, found about 15 at A. B. C. Liquors, Inc. They have a number of locations. Most have the same items, but I did pick up one each at two other A. B. C. locations. They're the main game in town. Others have minis, but

not like A.B.C.'s selection. There are even A.B.C. bottles in light and dark rum, vodka, and gin. Paid about \$10 for all fifteen bottles.

"In Fort Lauderdale, got nearly a dozen or so at Mayhue's. They have several locations too. The liquor store at the Miami airport has a pretty good selection, but I had all but one of what they were offering. And, I'm glad of that for they were high. A scotch cost me \$2.80 and their Reimerschmid's are \$8@, while the same item at Mayhue's is only \$3.25.

"Was also in San Diego last week and made a mini-bottle run down to Tijuana. Got a dozen and a half there. Mostly liquors and brandy/wine."

Again thanks to Mike for keeping us abreast of some of his finds and the good places to buy them. Certainly it would be nice if we could hear from a few others about their travels!

Maybe next time we'll have the chart up-to-date...hold on.
