
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MEMPHIS BELLE

What is most fun about the bottles for this column is that there is such a great variety. Bottles from all over the globe with all manner of contents. And, of course, this time is no exception.

We'll begin with the set of Salvador's. The proverbial if-this-were-in-color rule is again true. Very colorful contents. All three are Margaritas. The first is Cucaracha (cockroach?) Blue, the seonc Green Iguana (made with Midori), and the third is Senorita Strawberry. You've got to give the ad man who came up with these credit. They are glass and were found in Wis-

consin.

Moving on we have the two Cream Liqueurs. Not enough of them for a separate article; however, they are surely worth showing. The Feeney is a plastic bottle while the new Devonshire label is on a glass bottle. Both were found in the midwest.

Two more plastics are the Canadian Mist (a new label) and Captain Morgan's Parrot Bay. The latter is highly colorful and very well done. It was found here in So. Cal but since this brand is a national roll-out, it should be available just about everywhere.















Our east coast bottle hunter Vic Visalli found Tarantula Azul (blue) in New York City. It's glass and contains tequila with added citrus flavors. It comes via Missouri.

The last two bottles are not available in the U.S. but were recently issued in the U.K. Both are products of Gordon & Macphail of Elgin, Scotland. They are cask strength which gives both an extremely high proof or percentage of alcohol. The Caol Ila is 15 years old while the Bruichladdich is 30 years old. You scotch collectors will surely find a way of getting them.

This particular one may be a production piece or it might be the mock-up. What is known is that this is one spectacular piece. NEW CZECH VODKAS

This year a lot of new vodka miniatures were issued by several companies in the Czech Republic. To begin we have a company already well known in The United States. The Kord company is now producing Dvorak Vodka. It is a true reduction of the big bottle: a round, white frosted glass at 50ml capacity with a transparent locket in the middle where the portrait of A. Dvorak, the famous Czech composer, can be seen. This portrait on the back as well as the whole text is printed directly on the bottle. The closure is a black metallic screw cap.

An attractive series of vodka miniatures came out by Trul s.r.o. at the end of last year. This is the set of Stalinovy Slzy (Stalin's Tears). The group consists of four types: Original Vodka, Vodka &



Currant, Vodka & Lemon and Vodka & Pepper. All brands are 37.5% alc. in round clear glass bottles with 40ml contents. The labels are printed directly onto the bottles. Additionally to the series, the Trul's produce a single bottle with Jemna Vodka Mikulovicka. This one features a paper label.

Finally we have two single vodka bottles. The first is Martoff Luxury Choice Fine Russian Vodka at 40% vol. Its producer is the firm Likerka A. Stefan. The last bottle and one which should be liked in the U.S. is Vodka Original Manhattan 40% vol. It is a clear glass round bottle of 40ml capacity. There is also a 50ml plastic bag available. The producing firm is Glenn Hill Drinks a.s.

In the future we'll look at more vodkas from Poland and Hungary.

better motif than ships and you'll find them on both the Schooner Rum and the Black Eagle Anisette. They are also made by Master Wine Ltd.

The only plastic bottle in the group is the little Tamakari, the original Maltese Liqueur. This one is whisky colored while the other liqueur, Bajtra, is a light pink. Its label though features the famous Maltese Cross.

I suppose my other favorite among these is the John Brown Whisky. The John Brown character could have stepped from a 1930's clothing ad. Wonder what the name John Brown is to Malta?

There is a nice brandy not shown....but that makes for the basis of a future article! -J.S.-

VIPERINE

WATCH BOTTLES

"Watch" bottles are among the most scarce and desired and unusual miniatures ever produced. Due to size regulation changes, there probably will be no more. While most of them contained scotch, they will also be found with Irish whiskey, rum, sherry and cognac. For the most part they are rarely seen. Other than a series of twenty-four, picturing different flowers, issued in Englnad in 1981, they date from the 1970's back to pre-prohibition.

Our first pair, GLENOVAN and

CURRIE'S NO. 10 are extremely good ones. The Glenovan is a rare pre-pro and this is the only one I've ever seen. Currie's No. 10 may be familiar to you in other types of bottles.

YE OLDE MILL and STRONG'S are also top notch miniatures almost never seen. The Strong's label lists the amount as a "half gill" (pronounced jill) but this would be incorrect as the bottle would then contain less than a half ounce.


Strong's also produced at least





three other watch minis, Real Mountain Dew (two versions) and Strong's Dundee Whisky. All of these, especially the Dundee, are as rare and probably rarer than the version shown.

WHYTE & MACKAYS shows up from time to time and is considerably easier to find than the other four. Whyte and Mackay, coincidentally, owns W & S Strong so they have been very good to "Watch Bottle" collectors over the years.



SCOTCH

This time we turn to sets...and sets of straight malts at that. Not a blend in sight. Both of these sets are from this year and there's something for collectors on both sides of the Atlantic.

On my side we find the Murray McDavid group of six which were issued last March. These are exact miniatures of the larger bottles which I have heard are available in the U.S., but you don't have these little ones.

Going from the oldest first we have Macallan-Glenlivet. This is a twenty-one old from 1974 which came from a fresh sherry wood cask. Next we have Royal Brackla, a seventeen year old from 1979. It was from a refilled sherry wood cask. Third in the





series is **Bunnahabhain**, a seventeen year old also from 1979. And, it's from a refilled sherry wood cask.

The last of the 1979 seventeen year olds is the Linkwood. This came from a sherry wood cask but no mention is given of it being from a refill or of new sherry wood. However, look at how dark the contents are. No question but there's a lot of sherry in this one. Number five in the lot is the 1980 Glenturret. This sixteen year old is the third to use refilled sherry wood. The youngest of the bunch is the Laphroaig. It's only nine years oldl, but it comes from a cask originally filled with bourbon!

In case you're wondering, all of the bottles are 46% vol., 5cl. and











bottled last November.

Now on the west side of the pond, you got a set of five that we didn't get here in the U.K. This is the latest group from Signatory, the Edinburgh based company which has released a goodly number of interesting malts in the last few years.

Continuing with our program of the oldest first, we begin with the 1964 Longmorn. This one is thirty-two years old and is 57.5% alcohol or 115 proof. Next comes the Glen Grant at thirty-one years from 1965. It is a 58.4% or 116.8 proof. Third we have the

Port Ellen. It's from 1980, sixteen years old and the highest alcohol of the lot at 59.8% or 119.6 proof.

Next is another 1980 sixteen year old. This is the **Dufftown** which is the only one of the group with a blue label. It's 55.7% alcohol or 111.4 proof. Last and youngest is the twelve year from 1984, the **Glen Grant.** It's 57.9% or 115.8 proof. Four of the five came from Sherry Wood Casks, but the Port Ellen isn't saying. This was a limited edition of 250 sets.

Next time we'll go back to our usual mix. See you then. --DLM--





Three super whiskies by Penn Maryland are featured this month. These minis are all from the late 1930's or early 1940's. The bottles are the same shape, short round clear glass with a narrow neck. On the bottom of each bottle is an embossed branch of leaves. This style of bottle is known as the barrel.

The first mini is Penn Maryland Deluxe Blended Bourbon Whiskey. The center of the label is yellow. The whiskey is 90° as are the other two in this article. The next mini is

also a Penn Maryland Deluxe but is a blended rye whiskey. The center of the label is red. The last of the three is Penn Maryland Regal Blended Whiskey. The center of this label is green.

I know of one more Penn Maryland not shown here, that being a Penn Maryland Imperial Blended Whiskey. Does anyone know of any more? If you have one of the Penn Maryland Imperials for trade or sale, please let me know. Til next time. --B.J.--

It's rather ridiculous just to list of the names of the ones here as you can easily see them; however, there are a few fascinating little items about some of these. Society Club has the little word "Imitation" above RUM. Two Swallows is a Jamaica TYPE Rum and Shots was "For Intrastate Sale".

In the future we'll continue to look at some of the old California bottles. Wait until you see Tiny Tim and The Warrior.



MELO'S MINIS

In this article we'll get back to the more mundane. I would like to feature six of the numerous flats containing Early Times Kentucky Straight Bourbon Whiskey. All of these were bottled by Brown-Forman of Louisville.

The labels on the later ones state that they were bottled for Early Times Distillery Company Frankfort, Kentucky. I have always liked the colorful labels on these bottles which should be familiar to most collectors. As a matter of fact, one of these was among my first "prized" bottles at the dawn of my collecting.

Anyway, we lead off with a

screw cap at 90 proof and 24 months old. I also have a screw cap at 26 months old and pull off caps at 24 months and 36 months which are not pictured. Bottle two is a pull off at 90 proof and 4 years old. The next pair are also 90 proof at five and four years old respectively.

The last pair are Bottled in Bond at 100 proof and are somewhat harder to find. They are BIB 1935-1940 and BIB 1936-1940. Finally, the good thing about variations such as these is that when you do find them they probably will not cost you an arm and a leg.

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
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
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
