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
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
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### Let's Talk

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### WHAT'S NEW



It surely is a mixed bag for you this time. There are bottles from all over. So we'll begin with the ridiculous and hopefully work our way to something sublime.

The ridiculous to me is represented by the three Tooters. Found in Gatlinburg, TN, these adorable (he said with tongue firmly in cheek) plastic creations are Kamika (a blend of vodka and curacao), Melon Ball (a melon liqueur which won't have the Midori company quaking in its boots), and Purple Tooter (a blackraspberry liqueur). Need more be said.

Now if it 's vodka you're craving, there are eight for you to consider. The set of five Zone bottles comes originally from Italy but was found in So. California. You'll note everyone and his brother seems to be producing flavored vodkas today. Zone has banana, lemon, melon, peach, and tangerine. Nice frosted glass bottles though.

Our other three vodkas are the Ketel One Citron (lemon) which is available in almost all major markets, Skyy Citrus in a plastic bottle and the ever so chic Blavod in its plastic incarnation. (Maybe they





thought the airlines would buy since it changed to plastic.)

Continuing with our plastic orgy is the Canadian Mist which is simply a new label variation and Admiral Nelson's Spiced Rum which has a very nice label indeed. This last one is found in TN and FL.

Okay, we're heading toward sublime. The prize this issue is the Courvoisier Millennium







Cognac, an exact replica of the larger bottle. This is on the east and west coasts but doesn't seem to be too many places in between. Nice bottle with an interesting label.

Our last two are the Wild Turkey Rare Breed which sports a new and (I'd definitely say) improved label.

Soon it will be available just about everywhere. But we end on delightful note...even if you can't read the label of the bottle. (Yes, we know red photographs as black.) This is Hamashkeh Blended Kosher Scotch. It's been around for some time since this is a new label variation. I believe this year it was brought out on the east coast for Passover. # SEA CAPTAINS, ADMIRALS, Etc.



Scores of miniatures, many of them containing rum, feature "Men of the Sea" on their labels and make up a substantial part of many collections.

Three from Great Britain: Admiral's, Old Mo, and Skipper (all rums) are excellent examples of this genre. The first two are old corkers and will be harder to come by than our third bottle. None were sold in the U.S.A.

Admiral Nelson, a famous historical "sea man" can be seen on at least three entirely different types of minis: Beltran Gin (Spain), Admiral Nelson Rum (Germany) and





Nelson's Scotch (Scotland).

All are very recent, sold in the 1980's and with the exception of the scotch, might still be available. The Beltran label titled Lord Nelson is pictured here on a mini crock. Again, none of these were sold in the United States.

To begin let's look at six bottles from The Whiskey Connoisseur of Biggar, Scotland. I've shown you many of their bottles previously and these fit in with their usual scheme of things. Three are commemoratives: the dragon, lion and "U Sent Us Convicts" were all made to commemorate special events. The last of the three pertains to a match won by an Australian team. It is the

second group of three that I find much more interesting. These three are part of a much larger set which depict famous pub signs. My favorite, of course, is the Sherlock Holmes one.

I have two more commemora- tives for you and both of these celebrate the millennium. The 12 year old Walkers is from those people who make the marvelous shortbread while the other piece was produced exclusively for the Whisky Castle in Tomintoul. I still have at least



one more of these millennium bottlings to show you and I shall do so soon.

The Formidable Jock of Bennachie is one of a pair of bottles both of which feature this fine specimen of shaggy Highland cattle. The Bennachie bottle itself I've shown in a previous issue.

Four great figurals are featured this time from a company that didn't make a significant number of bottles. However, what they did produce are quality bottles and a great addition to any collection. The company is Delatour

In the first picture you see a ceramic Scottie Dog. The dog is black and is filled with Magic Punch. Next to it is one which I find extremely unusual. I have



never seen a pink Penguin before, have you? The bottle does have gold trim and lettering and is filled with a Pineapple Liqueur.

The second picture shows a deer which is a little taller than most miniatures. This blue piece is about the size of the deer by Rynbende. This bottle also has gold trim and lettering. It is filled with F and B Liqueur. The last one is a blue squirrel which again has

gold trim and lettering. The bottle contains Strawberry Liqueur.

Victor Nelson (nee Ramirez) of St. Croix, Virgin Islands, created many of the liqueurs used in the bottles. His Delatour brand was very successful until his death approximately twenty years ago.

# BLOSSOM IN GLASS

Every four years there is a big garden show in Germany entitled B U G A (Bundesgartenausstellung...in English... Federal Garden Show). Last year the BUGA '99 took place in Magdeburg. Now some readers will surely think what has this to do with miniature bottle collecting. But in this East German town thee is also a traditional distillery, Abtshof GmbH which bottles some of its products in miniatures. This distillery created a set of very original liqueurs for sale at the BUGA show.

These are based on infusions of various kinds of blossoms and each has 17% alcohol contents by volume. There are five brands with the titles Erika, Kamille, Lavendel, Löwenzahn and Veilchen. All five brands are available in miniatures, originally shaped flat clear glass bottles with a capacity of 0,02 litres, stopped with golden metallic screw tops.

All the bottles have the same main and back labels. The main labels show a real picture of a blossom with the brand



title in white letters at the bottom. On the back labels is the firm's logo in red at the top, below the text Blütenlikor (blossom liqueur), the name of the distillery, the Grüner Punkt sign (German recycling symbol), the information about the alcohol contents and the bottle size as well as the logo of the BUGA '99.

Colours of the single liqueurs and the main label backgrounds are blue (Lavendel – lavender), green (Kamille – camomile), pink (Erika – erica), purple (Veilchen - violet) and the last one which is yellow (Löwenzahn - dandelion).

The whole series was sold in a display box decorated with blossoms. The cardboard gift box also contained two tasting glasses with the firm's logo on them.

Unfortunately this set is very difficult to obtain today as the firm has been successful in selling out nearly its whole production in its stands during the BUGA '99. A small quantity is avail- able directly from the distillery.

# ...from ITALY

To begin I would like to show you some of my bottles from Italy. The first two are Amaro Averna and Anice Averna. Averna is a Sicilian distillery which produces very nice spirits. The two miniatures shown are about fifty

years old. On top of the bottles are the sigillo stella (the little silver seal). The value of the amaro (bitter liqueur 32%) is about 160,000 lire (US \$70+) while the anice is about 200,000 lire (US \$90+)

Next we have two from Cin-



zano, Amaro and Amaro Savoia. Cinzano is a national distillery established in Torino which is famous for its vermouth. These two miniatures are also about fifty years old. The spirits inside the bottles are the same, just change the name. The only difference is that one was issued about two years before the other. They also have the sigillo stella. The value of the pair is about 700,000 lire (US \$300+).

If you have bottles with the sigillo you can date them. Before this one was the sigillo monarchia which was from about 1935-1940.

I hope you enjoy my bottles.

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# **VODKA**

I am very sorry to have to report the demise of one of the finest producers of miniature vodka bottles that I have seen. This is the Dovgan distillery in Moscow. Mr. Dovgan was a real self promoter. He put his picture on his labels. He was also a very clever marketer who understood how to sell his vodka. A hologram lottery ticket was included with all of his large bottles as a gimmick to sell the brand. He likewise understood the value of packaging and therefore created some of the most beautiful bottles and labels yet seen on vodka bottles. Many of these were made in miniature.

The set of three 100 ml bottles featuring a winter scene, an autumn scene and a Czar Nicolas scene are among the most excellent miniature bottles that I have ever seen. They were recently pictured on the cover of the magazine, so many of you may recall them easily.

Mr. Dovgan was buying his vodka from a local vodka distiller in Moscow and then putting it in his bottles. His problem was that he couldn't build his export business fast enough to recover some of his investment. Cash flow became the problem and his supplier cut him off. The rest is history and it really is too bad. But if any of you have any Dovgan bottles in your collections, treasure them! —LS.—

### SHADY LADY



Yes, you're looking at the newest entry in the brothel series from Dug Picking. This series which is now well into its third decade adds the Shady Lady Ranch to its roster. However, there are some interesting little permutations this time.

The piece was made in Mexico and only 127 of them were produced. This ridiculously low number came about because of production problems. As you'll note, the statement "A Legal Brothel" is written on instead of being embossed. What you can't see is the back of the piece where the transfer which pinpoints the Shady Lady Ranch Nevada location has been glued on instead of being fired onto the ceramic. Dug said "whoa" and production ceased. No matter the problems though, if you have the set, you'll definitely want to finish up with this very Shady Lady!

# **MELO'S MINIS**

In this article I would like to feature Overbrook's Straight Rye Whiskey Bottled by The Overbrook Co. Inc. Baltimore, Md. This company also produced brands such as Washington Club Bourbon and Rye, Overbrook's Reserve Blended Whiskey, Southern Bar and Green Springs Blended Whiskey. All the Overbrook bottles in my collection are from the 1930's. These bottles are all attractive and may occasionally be found...with the possible exceptions of Green Springs and Southern Bar which are fairly rare.

Anyway, bottle number one is a private label which was bottled for Bushmill Products of Scranton, Pa. It is 90 proof and has a decal label. The next three bottles are embossed flats with red and black labels. They are 93 proof 2 1/2 years, 93 proof 3 years, and 90 proof 3 1/2 years old. The last two bottles are 86 proof 4 years and 90 proof 4 1/2 years old.

Finally, it seems that I will have to travel to Norway in the future to see my friends' collections. Until next time.....

The Landy Cognac name is one which many of you will easily remember from the marvelous glass bottles with the blown glass zodiac figures and also the similar bottles with different ships inside them. Those were done some years ago.

Now Landy has issued two more fancy bottles, the first of which you're seeing here and one which has been actually available for almost two years. I first saw this bottle in the famous Kawata shop in Ueno/Tokyo in late 1998. I was told it had been available that summer in the duty free shop at the Singapore airport.

Currently it may be found through the Hong Kong Miniature Liquor Collection (see ad elsewhere). The bottle is noteworthy because it has been plated with 24k gold! It surely will look stunning up there on your shelf! --DMS--

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
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
