NEW NEW ZEALAND, THIS & THAT

Our cover this month are four bottles from the Cook Islands, a self-governing nation in free association with New Zealand. Most Cook Islanders are also New Zealand citizens, so we almost, sort of, in a way, have NZ bottles on the cover.

There was an article in the Dominion Post newspaper showing the miniatures and the owner of Koteka, who was in NZ looking for a local distributor. I looked up him and the, very small, distillery on-line. I emailed him and he sent photos of his minis. Koteka is one of only two distilleries in The Cooks and the only one to make 'straight' bottles. The other makes the well known ceramic Tiki statues.

Now for some real NZ bottles – if you are feeling rich that is. A new distillery, Kiwi Spirit, is making a range of spirits and bottling two of them in miniature (100ml). The Waitui Manuka Honey Malt Whisky is \$25 per bottle, the Te Kiwi Silver Cloud 100% Blue Agave Spirit is \$70. They have to be kidding! \$70 for a mock Tequila?!? These are two NZ Miniatures I will not be buying. Just a thought, Wai in Maori is water and Tui is a bird and well known brewery – I feel a Tui Moment coming on.....







Sticking with NZ 'bottles' I have found three more shots. These are from Independent Liquor and are updated labels from ones shown previously.





The jewel encrusted Cognac Henri IV decanter is from Maison Dudognon. It is a 5cl mini at 41%. It is claimed to be (I don't doubt it!) the "World's Most

Expensive Cognac Mini." (or ANY mini!) Featuring 18kt Gold, Sapphires & Rubies. Designed by Fernando Altamirano, the CEO of Maison Dudognon, with only one made. It was for sale in

December 2015 at €289,000 - yes, 289 and 3 zeros! Rosie asked what I wanted for Christmas but refused to buy it for me. If she was not going to buy what I asked for why ask?

Erica Mulder has found a number of bottles currently being sold with NZ Importer's labels on them.





Online whisky specialist Master of Malt has launched a 'pick-and-mix' advent calendar, which can be chosen from its 4,000strong collection of spirits.





The new Drinks by the Dram advent calendar allows shoppers to build their own calendar of 24 x 30cl drams from across its extensive drammed spirits range, which currently comprises 3773 products. Each 3cl dram, which is bottled in-house, labeled and wax-sealed, varies in price from £3.04 for a Glen's Vodka to £395.95 for a 58-year old Glenfarclas 1953.

A sidebar allows shoppers to keep track of the contents - and more importantly the total cost - as they build their personalized collection.

The company launched its pre-filled Whisky advent calendars four years ago and has extended the range and broadened it to other spirits this year, to comprises 16 different versions. This includes bourbon, ginvent, whisky, premium whisky, rum, vodka, the botanical ginvent, tequila, cognac, Armagnac, absinthe, mescal, and naga chilli (£99.95 - £249.95). The most expensive of the pre-filled calendars is the old & rare whisky advent calendar, which will set you back a eye-watering £999.95.


The roll-out of the pick and mix version follows the relaunch of the Master of Matt website earlier this month, which made it fully responsive and more easily navigable, and allowed the company to build in the extra capabilities.

The Bitter Truth is a new liqueur from Germany. The Mocambo is a Mexican rum, the 79 pesos equals US \$5. Also new from Mexico are the set of three Tres Ochos (Three Eights) Tequilas.





The Cooperstown Baseball bottles were made for the Baseball Hall of Fame: vodka, bourbon and whiskey.

LIQUEUR

Malta is a small archipelago in the central Mediterranean between Sicily and the North African coast, the main islands being Malta & Gozo. It is a nation known for historic sites related to a succession of rulers including the Romans, Moors, Knights of St. John, French and British. It has numerous fortresses, megalithic temples and the Ħal Saflieni Hypogeum, a subterranean complex of halls and burial chambers dating to 3600 B.C.

The Maltese flag has the George Cross on it, Britain's highest civilian award for gallantry. This was awarded to the people of Malta in 1942 for steadfastly resisting a massive German & Italian onslaught, probably the most concentrated of WWII. The islands never gave up and was never occupied by Axis forces. If you don't know the story it is well worth looking up on-line.

There do not appear to be many bottles from Malta, I have so far only found 62 for Miniature Bottle Library, although I am sure there will be more. I have spent quite some time tracking down which bottles were made by which company but this is incomplete as there are still 4 bottles in 'other' that I do not know who made. Confusingly, two of the main producers have similar names, Master Wine and Master Group. Master group also own Master Cellars and a winery but they do not, as far as I can ascertain, own Master Wine. It's about time we saw some bottles.



The first two bottles are two I do not know who made. They are both Knights of Malta Bajtra liqueur and feature the Maltese Cross. Bajtra is a liqueur made from Prickly Pear cactus. Another knight bottle is the Tamakari liqueur from S. Sadson & Co.

John Borg & Son bottled whisky of dubious origin, although the tartan on the label is designed to make

you think it is Scotch.

Next we have a number of liqueurs from Master Group, all under their Zeppi's liqueur brand. The bottle on the right is the only one of this shape we know about but I am sure there must be more. On the next page we have one 'standard' bottle and 3 tall ones. The Anisette liqueur, with the larger capping, is the most modern bottle. MBL has photos of 11 bottles from this company.

















I cannot tell you anything about Ambrosia but they do make a nice range of liqueurs. We know of 12 varieties of these. Also shown are a Vodka and Lascar Rum.

Master Wine make a whole range of miniatures, liqueurs, spirits, vermouth and at least one cordial. Shown on the last page we start with Senatore Vino Vermouth, there is at least one other version of this. Somehow I don't feel as if I would enjoy Aperitiv or the Peppermint Cordial. Black Eight anisette liqueur may be more to my liking. Starting the next row we have Madlien liqueur in the distinctive bottle, followed by Le Grand Duc brandy, Piccadilly gin (I know of 3 versions, all similar) and two versions (I don't know which is the newer one) of Trosky vodka. The one with the fancy crest also comes with a white cap. On the right we have two Schooner rums), Black Label and Light & Dry (there is also a white cap version of the Light & Dry, followed by John Brown whisky.

I have identified three liqueurs from De Hollander. As well as

the cherry brandy liqueur shown there is also Lemoncinello liqueur and crème de menthe.

The three final ones on the left start with a can of Cisk Export Lager. This is true to label and says it was canned in Malta but is an Alpa micro size

can, filled with water, from Italy. Sonon Menendez made the, obviously older, Peach Brandy. There is also an Apricot Brandy. Our final bottle is, I think, a

brandy, although nowhere does it say so. Nor does it say who made it. All I can tell you is that it is a 15 year old something called Old Premiers, Single Classe.

Just a note to let you know that there have been



87,000 BEER CANS







Jeff Lebo began collecting cans in 1975 at the age of just 13 and has since amassed thousands of cans from all over the world. Supposedly they have been valued at UD\$1.6M.

He is now using his collection as a tourist attraction, lining the walls of his Brewhouse Mountain Eco Inn in Pennsylvania with beer cans and beer paraphernalia. Guests get to sleep in the novelty accommodation and fellow beer can enthusiasts can (no pun intended) share in his passion.

"It's sort of an ongoing labour of love, I like being able to preserve social history in a way" he told *The New York Post.* " "We're now renting it out as an inn and it is amazing to see the people who have come to stay here who are fascinated by this," said Lebo's wife, Lauri.

While Lebo said he is unlikely to ever sell his collection, he admitted he had cashed in on some of the more valuable cans to pay for a piece of property in Costa Rica. "We are actually converting it into an eco-resort and we're hoping in about three years or so we'll be open for business," said Lebo.

I promised you no more poems in miNiZ109 and I kept my word as this is the second verse of a popular song from 1910. A number of variations of this song appeared



have the mine entrance, complete with miner, from Cyrus Noble. There is a whole set built around the concept on an old west mine, all containing 50ml of Bourbon.

The first miner's mule is another of the Cyrus Noble bottles. Following this are the miner and his mule from Kontinental, which contains 50ml of Bourbon. Interestingly, the same bottle is filled with 100ml of Mint Syrup and 50ml of Sherry, although in the latter case the label says 750ml. Ski Country made the Burro (strictly speaking a small donkey, rather than a mule) in 1973. Given the size, I suspect the





over the years, including a VERY bawdy one (I'll leave that to your imagination!).

Above is, of course, one of Dug's Brothels which need no introduction. Much less well known is the miner and cart from Paul Schubert of Germany. This can be found with different bottles in, although the Lautergold bottles are very appropriate. There is another one of these from Paul Schubert with the miner pushing the cart and only one bottle. Finally for the first group we

The 4 coal miners on the last page, and the first on this are all from Old Commonwealth. They each contain 50ml of Bourbon. The last miner is, err...., complicated. He is a Peruvian miner, and even contains Pico, the national drink of Peru, but this is an

Italian bottle from a maker that sounds like they come from Mexico, Hacienda del Abuelo! Confused? You can bet I was when I catalogued them for Miniature Bottle Library. It took me ages to check the facts as they were shown as Peruvian by the collector who owns these.

We cross the Atlantic for our next bottle, a Cornish Tin Mine from Cornish Mead. Some Cornish Mead bottles are very common, this is not one of them.



It is a short hop to Germany for the 19th Century miner's lamp. It is from Manfred Picht and contains 100ml of Dur Wüzige Halb Bitter (whatever that is). I think that Harzer Grubenlicht probably is the German name for a miner's lamp but Google Translate will not translate it. There is another of these with the name Wolfgang Picht – Manfred's father I believe.

We come all the way back to New Zealand for the Air New Zealand Miner's Hall. This contains 50ml of either Wilson's New Zealand Whisky or Port Nicholson Scotch. This is one of a set of eleven NZ buildings. The Port Nicholson Scotch bottles were a special run organised by the club

(at the time the Port Nicholson Miniature Bottle Club). The hall was built during the West Coast gold rush of the 1800's.

If you are mining gold or silver you need to have it assayed (checked for purity as that affects the price to be paid). The Assayer is another bottle from Cyrus Noble.

No article on Miners would be complete without the product of their labours. I cannot find any miniatures of coal or tin, nor a bar of silver, so this Masthead Scotch gold bar from McLech and the gold money sack from Jiugui of China will have to do. The latter contains 50ml of Nu Er Hong Chinese Spirit @ 52%.

AMERICAN MOONSHINE

While there have been several new mini Moonshine bottles put out in the last few years, in the past 12 months, miniature American Moonshine has definitely made its mark on Liquor Store shelves around the country. It is not surprising that most of the new legitimate Moonshine is made in North Carolina, Tennessee, and Kentucky. After all, the Mountains in these states have been providing secluded places for the Moonshiners to distill their special recipies for the last few hundred years.

Here is a small sampling of what is available today. These products come in mini Mason Jars, and Jugs, as well as the typical straight bottles. A lot of the new moonshine is also available in as many as 10 or 15 different flavors.

My guess is we will start to see a lot more Mini Moonshine brands hit the market as this new craze becomes even more popular in the future. So sit back and take a look!









I came across this set of 20 miniature rums from Guyana a few weeks ago. Except that, a bit of detective work later, I discovered they were not from Guyana. The contents are but they were bottled by Just Miniatures in the UK. All are 5cl, 37.5% and all are still available to buy on Just Miniatures web site for \pounds 2.99 each. There is also a set of 19 Sportsman Scotches, also \pounds 2.99 each.

WINES #3 - U S 🖪

As before, a similar article, with different photographs, will again appear in the MMBC newsletter.

It is not too difficult to find wines from the US but, as far as I can ascertain, there are virtually none made in the 2000's. The only US company I can find with modern bottles is Boyden Valley Winery, who make the Vermont Ice Desert Ice Wine. The Red version is our first photo. There are quite a number of wineries from over-the-border in Canada who bottle Ice Wine in miniature so instinct tells me there should be more US wineries doing so. Anyone know of any?

The largest range of US wines that I know of is made by Amador Winery. I have identified 87 so far for Miniature Bottle library and I'm sure there are more. These were made for the tourist trade in the 1970's & 80's. Most of the bottles are of places in California & Nevada, although there is a 'Boston Tea Party' bottle. I have tried to show as many bottle and label variations as I can, although I am sure there will be more. The brown bottle is one of only two I know of.





Probably the best known US winery to mini bottle collectors is Paul Masson, now part of Constellation Brands. The first bottle I have to show you is a 'Special,'

I suspect there are more of these than I know about. Shown is 'Valentine's Greetings, Richard's Lilac Lodge.' Also on MBL are The Little Corporal Restaurant & Lounge and simply 'To My Valentine.' All these appear on Rarity Rare Cream Sherry heart shaped bottles.





Shown are an older Rare Cream Sherry, A Rare Dry Sherry from the same era as the 'specials' and a Rare Tawny Port. Not shown are Rare Flor Sherry & Rare Sauzao Port. Paul Masson have also bottled brandy in these bottles. I have only found one wine, Oro Fino, in a round bottle.



Three Monks was made by House of Old Molineaux, yet another California winery. Shown are Dry Sherry & Port. I also know of a Sherry and a Muscatel.





We cross the continent to bring you bottles from Widmer's Wine Cellars of Naples, New York. These are old bottles but Widmer's are still in business. I suspect the labels are interchangeable between the brown and clear bottles but there is only one green bottle I know of, a Vermouth. Not shown are a Blackberry, Muscatel, Pale Dry Sherry and a Port.

On the left is one of only two miniature 'straights' that we know about from the US' largest winemaker (and one of the largest private companies), Ernst & Julio Gallo (aka. E & J Gallo). The other we know of is a Muscatel but I'm sure there are more out there somewhere.

At the start of the next page we have four bottles from Gibson Wine Co., 4 of 24 we

know about. I suspect that the first two bottles are the oldest. We only know of two clear bottles and four 'White Pheasant' brown bottles. The other two 'Vel-Crest' bottles are floc covered and come in various colours.

Meier's is another winery well known to mini bottle collectors but mainly for their ceramic jugs etc. MBL has 14 wine minis from Meier's but I suspect there are a lot more than that.

GIVE ME A RING

Telephones have changed considerably over the years since Alexander Graham Bell first spoke into his experimental telephone on March 10, 1876. Bell is credited with the invention, and in a way that is OK as he made the telephone a practical device, but there is no doubt that he was building on ideas by other inventors, one or more of which may have transmitted a voice message up to thirty years earlier.



The first two photos show the oldest design made in miniature. The glass phone is from Dor of Argentina, the ceramic one is from Casa Vinicola Boccaccio of Italy, the same design was also made by Todisco.



The French Telephone is a very well known bottle from Famous Firsts. The bottle in the (plastic) telephone was made in France for the Japanese market. This one was made by Dorville but it has also been made by Grangossier in both green and purple. Probably the rarest telephone mini is the brass telephone on a wood box. In the box is a glass jar containing sugared brandy. Yuk! This is another Famous Firsts bottle. There are at least 29 of these wood box & jar minis with different objects or people on them.

The three telephones on the left are all from the same Russian pottery but were filled by three different companies, Ochakovskaya (yellow), Krasnyarsk Distillery (blue), both from Russia and

(red) of Germany. The phone on the right is another one from Dor. Shown is one with a duck on it but they have also been made with a dog and several flowers. Finally, on the right we have one of two mobile phones from Weisenbach of Germany.
