COVER BOTTLES / AUCTION BOOTY

The cover photos and the ones below show the New Zealand bottles that I obtained at the recent auction.

The four Jim Beam personalised bottles were all on the NZ Minis list but are new to my own collection. The three J. Benais & Co. Cognacs are from a group of at least four imported by The Simons Proprietary Limited, 18 - 24 James Street, Whangarei. The Vieille Reserve was not previously listed. For those who haven't seen these the label is white with the borders in gold, the shield is blue, gold and red, and the writing is in a mixture of black, red and blue. These are certainly some of the nicer old NZ bottles you can obtain.

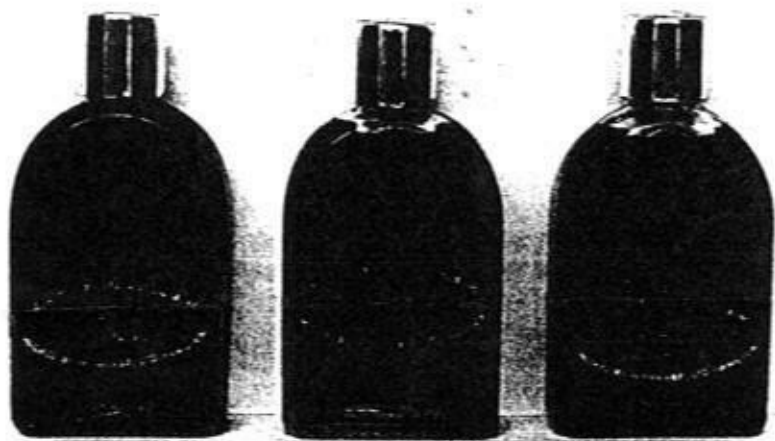
The three little flasks state "Packed by Wynn Abel Ltd, Hamilton." They are clear glass bottles with clear labels. The contents are shown in blue and the other writing is in gold. Very few of these have turned up in collections. So far as we are aware there is only one other in the series, Blackberry Brandy. A little more common but new to me is the Fremy Fils Prunelle D'Anjou. The label states "Specially Prepared for the New Zealand Market." There are known to be four other Fremy Fils bottles done especially for the NZ market, two Chesky Cherry Whisky and two Orasky Orange Whisky. The label is not very exciting, the background is green, the writing gold and there is a bit of orange on the shields.

The CZ Manzanilla Sherry was on the NZ minis list previously but only because I had seen it in Les's collection. Unfortunately it is in poor condition so you may not get much of an impression from the photograph. The next two bottles have not been previously reported. The Grandvin Brown Brandy Wine (sounds b___y terrible) was bottled by the Grand Hotel, Dunedin. The bottle is brown and has a white label. The label is somewhat faded but I think that the words "Brown Brandy Wine" were in gold. All other writing is in black. By coincidence the final bottle shown is Grand Hotel *** Cognac. This was bottled in NZ by Arthur A. Paape. Has anyone ever heard of this company before? The bottle is clear and has a white label. The word "Cognac," the leaves and grapes, and the border are in gold and green. "Pure Grape Brandy" is reversed from a blue background. This last bottle is in perfect condition and I believe it to be a real find.

If anyone would like a copy of the NZ Miniatures list just drop me a line and I will send you one. The only condition is that if you find a NZ bottle not on the list I want to know about it.

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M.G.A.A.N.Z.

The collection of our former member, Les Wilton, was finally put up for sale on Saturday the 22nd. June. All members should have received advance notice from the club. Our New Zealand Members and those overseas members who either asked for a catalogue or had dealt with Manawatu Auctions before also received a catalogue direct from the auctioneers.

We had an excellent turn-out from club members who came from as far away as Christchurch. If truth be told we did in fact only start off with one member from Christchurch but by the end of the afternoon we had three - see "New Members." One of these, plus another collector, were in Palmerston North for a bowls tournament and only found out about the auction by accident. There were a total of 41 bidders of which 22 were postal bidders - I suspect an even better turnout from club members here. Two of our overseas members, David Maund and Dick Cotton were bidding and obtained bottles. German, Arthur Simon, who is not a member, also successfully bid from overseas. In addition, yours truly was bidding (sometimes successfully) on behalf of our lone Norwegian member, Jan Odegaard.

The bottles were well displayed although not as well lotted up as they could have been. I understand that the Wilton family, rather than the auctioneers, sorted them into lots. Most of the Wellington members who went got up well before dawn to be in Palmerston North for the viewing which commenced at 8.30. Two and a half hours sounds like plenty but I was certainly pushed for time to examine all 630 lots properly - and then examine some of them a second time on behalf of Jan. I needed the 9 minutes the auctioneer was late in starting by!

Jim and Dave are the owners of Manawatu Auctions. Usually they share the auctioneering but this time Jim was on the rostrum the whole time. Jim would be one of the best auctioneers I have ever encountered. He is clear, friendly, reads out each lot number and when the lot is knocked-down names the buyer number and price. All this at 200 lots per hour - a very remarkable achievement.

For those of you who like statistics they read like this:-

Minis unsold - 67

Total minis excluding above 4,327

Realisation \$12,765 = Av. \$2.95 each.

Splitting the ceramics and fancy glass off gives:-

Total Ceramics and fancy glass - 167

Realisation \$1,599 = Av. \$9.57 each

Total straight glass - 4,160

Realisation \$11,166 = Av. \$2.68 each

Within the straight glass there were some large variations. Whiskey, especially Scotch, sold very well (by New Zealand standards) with lots of 8 bottles fetching up to \$130. The highest price paid was \$215 although as this was for 12 M.A.B. white ceramic animals this was by no means 'over the top'. The highest individual bottle price was \$85 for the Old Hokonui miniature (the pint bottle only sold for \$45!) I believe that the miniature would have gone higher but for the doubt as to its authenticity (all other known examples are different).

Like almost everyone else there I came away satisfied, only missing one bottle I really wanted. Some of my 'prizes' appear on the front cover. My average cost was \$20 per bottle put into my collection but that will come down enormously when I dispose of the swaps - some which had 'hidden' value! I say almost everyone was satisfied because Vice-President Colin Kilpatrick came away empty handed. Colin collects only Scotch and the lots he wanted were the ones fetching the highest prices. Colin assures me that even he thought the journey to Palmerston North was worth it. Better luck next time.

The auctioneers have confirmed to me that there is another auction coming up. This is the collection of former member Stan Keutenius. If you did not get or did not ask for a catalogue for this last auction but want to participate in the next one I suggest that you write to the auctioneers. Probable date is October. Start saving your money!

Speedy Gonzalez has been fabled in song and story as the most notorious character in all of Mexico. But perhaps much of his wickedness could be blamed on his national spirit—the fiery concoction known as tequila.

A REVOLUTIONARY *Spirit*

SEÑOR SPEEDY Gonzalez has achieved international renown as the most revolting man in all Mexico — an achievement of some note when it is considered that Mexico may be regarded as the spiritual home of all really serious revolutionaries.

It has been quite unfairly asserted that most of Señor Gonzalez's problems stemmed from a predilection for a particularly pernicious species of beer rendered marginally palatable by the addition of a wedge of lime prior to ingestion. I shall not talk any more about the singing spirit, except to state that recent research has identified a more probable cause of young Speedy's all-round bad attitude. I refer, of course, to tequila — a portion brought to you by the same bunch that lost its presence of mind long enough to deliver Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass. For the benefit of señors and señoritas who came in late, this is where the story really begins.

Tequila is basically a white spirit, fermented and distilled from a sugary pulp which is steamed and stripped from the fibrous leaves of the semi-alpine blue agave. Although often referred to as a cactus, the blue agave is a member of the genus *Amaryllidaceae* and is thus more properly a lily. Tequila is the lineal descendant of *pulque* — a drink developed by the

ancient Aztecs from the fermented juice of the mescal plant, a sort of desert bean, and a concoction which may go some way towards explaining the contemporary dearth of ancient Aztecs in your average saloon bar. The modern drink, despite rumours to the contrary, lacks the hallucinogenic properties of its ancestor. (Anyone interested in exploring what mescal can do to, or for, the casual day-tripper might care to read *The Doors Of Perception* by Aldous Huxley — the late Aldous Huxley.)

Today's spirit takes its name from the township of Tequila, itself named after a long-gone tribe of Mexican Indians. The blue agave flourishes in the dry, acidic soils provided by the sandy slopes of a nearby volcano.

Mexican law requires that at least 51 per cent of the alcohol in any bottle labelled "tequila" must derive from the blue agave, with the balance mostly comprising neutral grain spirit distilled from maize or other cereal crops. The law also states that the blue agave (a single, specific variety) must be harvested from defined production areas, mainly in the state of Jalisco.

Tequila is double distilled and usually wood matured in casks of oak or redwood, from which it derives its colour and a little mellowness notably absent from the raw

spirit. Its commercial production dates back to the mid-19th century, although Tequila's antecedents extend back to the early days of Spanish colonial settlement. The oldest current producer and by far the biggest is Tequila Cuervo SA of Guadalajara. The esteemed house of Cuervo dates from the days of Don José María Guadalupe de Cuervo who gained a Mexican land grant from the king of Spain in 1758 and later scored a warrant from the government of 'New Galicia' for the exclusive production of *vino mescal de tequila*. Other major brands include El Toro, Don Emilio, Pancho Villa, Pepe Lopez, Monte Alban and Don Gusano (the latter two bottles replete with the traditional mescal worms).

Reposada tequilas such as Gold Cuervo Especial are matured for six months in big redwood tanks. Super premium *añejo* tequilas like Sauza's Tres Generaciones or Cuervo 1800 may spend up to eight years in oaken casks before emerging spitting and cursing into the sunshine.

Tequila's moment of international glory came in the early 1980s when the surfing fraternity — like preceding generations desperate to find a drink guaranteed to be greeted with shock, horror and shrill predictions of the direst of consequences by their elders — decided that the obscure

little Mexican drop met all the specifications very nicely. The worm in the bottle was a positive bonus.

Meanwhile, back in downtown Guadalajara, the locals tend to stick to white or *claro* tequila, usually broken down with a dash of mineral water.

Purists and those of a suicidal bent prefer to meet their tequila head-on in a ritual summarised as follows: one — lick salt, two — slam down caballito (shot glass) of hooch, three — suck lime wedge, four — start over. It's strictly a routine for grown-ups.

For those of even stronger fibre, good old-fashioned mescal is still around — a brew once described by American author Malcolm Lowry as “ten yards of barbed wire”.

It is not for nothing that, back in 1914, tequila gave rise to one of the western hemisphere's great revolutionary drinking songs. To my somewhat blurred recollection, it went something like this: *Si porque me ves borracho, mañana ya no me ves* — a touching ballad loosely translated as “today you see me drunk, tomorrow you won't see me at all”. The stuff does tend to have that effect.

Having already gained cult status with significant sections of the international youth market, tequila is now making a determined bid to sneak into polite society. The following cocktail variants will not necessarily chew up your entire sick leave entitlement in convalescence:

Margarita

60ml tequila

60ml fresh lime juice

30ml white curacao

Shake or blend with crushed ice and serve in salt-rimmed cocktail glass.

Freddie Fudpucker

30ml tequila

120ml fresh orange juice

1 dash galliano

Stir and serve over crushed ice, garnished by orange slice and cherry.

Tequila Sunrise

30ml tequila

120ml fresh orange juice

2 dashes grenadine

Serve over ice garnished with orange slice and cherry.

HISTORY IN MINIATURE IRISH WHISKEY

In 1987 there were 28 distilleries in Ireland. Now there is only one company - Irish Distillers. Ireland boasts the oldest operating distillery in the world - Bushmills. It was first licensed in 1608. It is situated in Antrim in the north of Ireland. All the other Irish whiskies are made in Midleton in the south.

The Irish claim - probably rightly that they invented whiskey. It is said to be a gift from St Patrick. All Irish whiskies are blends apart from Bushmills 10 year old.

The main differences between Irish and Scots whiskies are:

- 1 the minimum age: 5 for Irish; 3 for Scotch.
- 2 no peat is used for Irish whiskey
- 3 Irish whiskey is triple distilled which tends to remove more of the undesirable elements.

The Irish whiskies most commonly seen in miniatures are:

JAMESON

The distillery was founded in 1780 by a Scotsman. John Jameson went to Ireland to learn how to make whiskey and decided to stay. The first distillery was built in Dublin but it eventually became too small. The whiskey is now made in Midleton, County Cork. The distillery has the largest pot still in the world.

TULLAMORE DEW

This is the lightest of the Irish whiskies and is said to be the classic example of this spirit. One of the company's heads, Daniel E. Williams, decided to add his initials to the distillery name and Tullamore Dew was born.

POWERS

John Power and Son was founded in 1791 and every miniature collector should have one in his or her collection. They invented the miniature bottle (nicknamed "Baby Power"). This fulfilled the important need of a final glass of whiskey to take away at closing time. It actually required a special act of Parliament in 1860 to permit the unusual size - 2.5 fl. oz.. The bottle was said to contain 3 swallows of the whiskey. For this reason, the birds were incorporated into the label.

BLACK BUSH

This is a deluxe whiskey and is produced in the old Bushmills distillery. It takes its name from the River Bush. Black Bush had, until 1984, been a silent success story. It had never been advertised. In 1984 it was introduced into the United States and was immediately successful. Sales have increased 30% ever since.

BUSHMILLS

In 1608 Sir Thomas Phillips, the King's Deputy in Ulster, was given the authority to

grant licences to distil. Being no fool (was he an Irishman?) he granted the first one to himself. This resulted in the world's first licensed whiskey distillery. It is Ireland's only all malt whiskey and is aged for 10 years.

PADDY

Paddy is made by the Cork Distilleries Company which was founded in 1869. they sold their whiskey by the cask to publicans who sold it from the glass from the wood or bottled it themselves. Eventually the whiskey was called "Cork Distillers Company's Old Irish Whiskey" - a bit of a mouthful after a few glasses of Guinness.

About this time, the company's top salesman, Paddy Flaherty, was renowned for his generosity in dispensing the company's product. Where ever Paddy went the pubs would be packed with thirsty locals. Even when he was not in residence the public would order a glass of Paddy's whiskey and the name stuck.

I must admit to not owning a bottle of Powers whiskey. If anyone would like to swap a bottle please let me know and we'll try to come to some arrangement.

THE BRAMSCH DISTILLERY

with a new statute and with eight new minis



The Bramsch distillery is the largest liquor producer in Dresden, East-Germany. Dresden is the ancient residence of Saxonian kings, and, in the next future it will become the capital of the Country of Saxony in prospectively united Germany. There are more than 500,000 inhabitants, a number of historical buildings as well as three distilleries in this town laying on the Elbe river in the South of the GDR.

Until the revolution of October 1989 the Bramsch distillery was a state company, registered under the Name VEB Bramsch Dresden. It produced about 16 liqueur and spirits brands. Some of them was bottled in miniatures by the firm C. Spielhagen at Dresden. Today that distillery is a limited co., entitled Bramsch Dresden GmbH. The new company's management continues the cooperation with the family firm C. Spielhagen which bottles the Bramsch products into miniatures bottles.

This time both Bramsch and C. Spielhagen marked eight new miniatures. They are two single liqueurs as well as a series of four spirits and two liqueur brands. All the liqueurs are round clear glass bottles with a shaped neck, all the spirits issue in GDR's standard round clear glass bottles. All eight ones are 50 ml. The series bottle labels show various sights of Dresden in two colours in each case. The single bottle labels are different of the series labels; while the Newari is a black paper label with a golden printing, the Radeberger's one is multicoloured in blue, yellow, green and red.

The Bramsch series consists of a mild brandy blend entitled Goldbrand 32%, a vodka entitled Kristall 40%, a mild corn brandy Sachsen Stolz 32%, a clear spirits Dresdner Klarer 32%, a fresh fruit liqueur Kirsch 20%, and a bitters entitled Stonsdorfer Bitterlikoer 35%. The single liqueurs are a bitter aperitif Newari Bitter 30% and a cordial entitled Original Radeberger Bitterlikoer 35%.

Well, I hope that aren't the latest news about East-German miniatures in the MiNiZ newsletter because the changes in our area in the last time bring many new possibilities also for the local liquor industry. A lucky bottle hunting!

MCCORMICK AND THE GREAT AMERICANS.

It is expecially appropriate that the McCormick Distillery is the one to create these fully authentic collector bottles representing America's greatest figures.

McCormick, America's oldest operating distillery, was founded in 1856 by Ben Holladay the legendary "King of Hurry", operator of the Overland Stage Line, backer of the Pony Express. The Overland, the Pony Express, and Ben's giant figure are integral parts of the lore of America....and McCormick Straight Bourbon Whisky can be considered so, too.

Ben Holladay started McCormick at the booming frontier town of Weston, Missouri, beside a sparkling pure limestone spring that had been charted by Lewis and Clark. Over the years, Ben's enterprise has endured to become America's oldest operating distillery.

These McCormick Collector Bottles are as true-to-life as serious study of historic records and portraits can make them. They have been sculptured and hand-painted by skilled craftsmen to be authentic portraits of the figures they represent. Every serious bottle collector and student of America's history will want all of the Great Americans.

WILL ROGERS.

Will Rogers, America's "cowboy philosopher," was born on November 4, 1879. Young Will worked on his father's ranch and this was where he first became an expert roper. Rogers' formal schooling was brief, including attending for a short time Kemper Military Academy. While at Kemper, Will gained a reputation for mischief and gathering demerits, and soon, bored of his academic surroundings, departed school and returned to Oklahoma.

Next, Will found a job in Texas working as a cowboy. Wonderlust siezed him, and in 1902 he decided he would like to try his hand as a cattle wrangler in Argentina. Will worked on ranches for five months until he was, as he later put it, "plum busted." Rogers boarded a cattle boat for South Africa, "chaperoning mules and she cows to Africa."

Arriving in South Africa, Will joined Texas Jack's Wild West Show. This would be his introduction to the world of show business. Will took advantage of an opportunity to travel to New Zealand and Australia. Soon he joined the Wirth Brothers Circus in Sydney, Australia, adopted the name of the "Cherokee Kid".

Rogers participated in the Ziegfield Follies from 1916 to 1918 and again between 1924 and 1925. It was these appearances in the Follies that brought Will his first real national fame.



In 1926 Rogers began contributing articles to newspapers, and this endeavour gained for him new recognition.

Between 1930 and 1935 he appeared in 17 films, the best known of which included: Ambassador Bill; State Fair; David Harum; A Connecticut Yankee at King Arthur's Court; Handy Andy; Steamboat Around the Bend; and Judge Priest.

In 1930, Will Rogers had stated: "When I die, my epitaph, or whatever you call those signs on gravestones, is going to read: 'I joke about every prominent man of my time, but I never met a man I didn't like'."

On August 17, 1935, Will Rogers, travelling with his friend, Wiley Post, had been killed in an airplane crash in Alaska.

DIANNE OPIE

Zombie Voodoo

1 egg white	1 tspn sugar or sugar
4-5 ice cubes	syrup
juice 1 fresh lime	1 part white rum
or lemon	1 part golden rum
juice 1/2 fresh	1/2 part dark rum
orange (or 2	1 slice orange
tblspns canned	1 sprig fresh mint
unsweetened juice)	1 maraschino cherry
3 drops Angostura	
bitters	

- 1 Pour the ice cubes into a cocktail shaker.
- 2 Pour the fruit juices over the ice and shake the bitters into the shaker.
- 3 Add the sugar, egg white, white and golden rum.
- 4 Shake until a frost forms.
- 5 Pour without straining into a Collins glass (a tall glass).
- 6 Garnish with the fruit.
- 7 Top off with the dark rum.
- 8 Stir once and serve.
- 9 Give car keys to spouse.
- 10 Sip very slowly over next hour.

Any faster and you're in **BIG** trouble.

I chose this cocktail because it reminded me of some very good times I had sipping Zombies at a bar near the University in Honolulu when I was attending a seminar there. The name is very apt; undue familiarity put a curse on you and turned you into the "Walking Dead" in very quick - but enjoyable - time.



Tales behind our popular liqueurs

We were lunching at a city club and enjoying a glass of Penfolds Grange 1982 with the cheeses when the subject of liqueurs arose.

Which were the most popular and what were the ingredients in the sometimes mysterious beverages?

I have judged liqueurs in Melbourne and Brisbane during the 1960s, so I decided to do some research on some of the most popular to share with you.

Benedictine, it is thought, was created in the monastery at Fecant by Dom Vincelli of the Benedictine Order in 1510.

Given its early origins, it is probably the oldest existing liqueur.

It is made from cognac and a range of herbs, including angelica, coriander, thyme, cloves, saffron, cinnamon and nutmeg. I believe that honey is also used.

The initials DOM on every bottle stand for the Benedictine motto Deo Optimo maximo (To God, Most Good, Most Great).

It no longer has any connotation with the Benedictines or with any other religious order.

B & B, which is half Benedictine and half Brandy, also enjoys a good market share.

Chartreuse is the only major liqueur still made by monks of the Carthusian order in Tarragona, Spain and Voiron, France.

The recipe was given to the Order in 1605 and the complicated recipe includes a brandy base with herbs and plants to provide the flavouring.

The herbal character is prominent with the smell and flavour.

Chartreuse is either green or the less alcoholic and sweeter yellow variety.

Cointreau is made by the Cointreau brothers in Angers, France.

It is a double distillation of bitter and sweet oranges with clear spirit and sugar.

Tia Maria is supposedly named after a servant girl, Maria, who took with her an ancient family beverage on parchment when her Spanish mistress fled the advancing British army in Jamaica.

The recipe was given to her mistress' daughter and named after the faithful maid.

The West Indian liqueur is based on rum and flavoured with different Jamaican spices and coffee.

Van der Hum grew out of the efforts of the early Dutch colonists of South Africa to recreate one of the drinks of their homeland - curacao.

It is made from brandy and the principal ingredient is the peel of a small local orange type fruit called nartjie.

It is tawny in colour and spicy, but not too sweet.

Drambuie, so they say, dates back to the days of bonny Prince Charlie.

It is said that the prince gave the secret recipe of his own private liqueur to a fellow named McKinnon as a reward for helping him to escape to France.

It is still a family secret how this whiskey, heather honey and herbs liqueur is made. It has a smooth taste and is a little sweet on the finish.

Galliano is named after Major General Guiseppe Gallian who fought in the Abyssinian War of 1895.

He became a national hero, which explains the fort shown on the label.

It has an almost licorice taste with a marshmallow flavour on the back palate.

Grand marnier is the other great orange-flavoured liqueur of France.

It was created in 1827 and is still based on the original recipe of oranges and quality cognac.

The liqueur has a stunning perfume with smooth complexity on the palate, sweet, and has excellent length in the aftertaste.

It blends well when mixed with whipped cream on pears cooked in claret.

Of course, all of the liqueurs have the power of alcohol in them but it is well-balanced with the other ingredients.
