While stopping over in Singapore Ian also picked up this cute little plastic mini containing the famous "Singapore Sling".


Price of these minis approximately \$4-8 NZ.

Have. You. Seen. These?



Three of these bottles featured on the cover of miNiZ in May 1987 so they should be familiar to our longer standing members but I suspect that most of our newer members will never have seen them.

Glen Urquhart Wines were bottled by T.G. Ross of Palmerston. That's Palmerston in Otago, not Palmerston North. The two smaller sizes of bottles are round, clear glass and are sealed with a cork. The larger bottles are a small flask with a metal screw top. The labels are all basically the same, a white background and map of New Zealand, a blue circle and writing, and a tartan stripe.

All bottles contain wine. One of each size has red wine and one white. One of the larger bottles has Cherry wine and we know of one the same shape with Apricot wine. The small size shown here is the smallest mini known to have been produced in New Zealand.

I picked these up in a Junk/Antique shop in Dunsandal, south of Christchurch. I know that Robin Mellish got his direct from Mr. Ross in Palmerston but don't bother trying the same as Robin got the last ones.

VARIATIONS LOVE EM OR HATE EM





In the last issue of miNiZ I showed you most of the known New Zealand variations of Seagers Dry Gin and Cossack Vodka. If you really want to get into variations of the same bottle you have to choose something made in a multitude of countries or made for a multitude of countries, each with it's own label. The most variations I have ever heard of would be the personalised Jim Beam bottles which run into thousands. If you think personalised bottles is cheating I have heard of a number of bottles with over 100 known variations. The only one I can remember when writing this is Dewars White Label Scotch.

Above you will see all 6 known variations of Wilsons Whisky. There is a seventh but this is a personalised bottle. It was bottled for General MacMotors.

Below are all 6 known variations of Totara Cafe. Getting all 6 is not easy. Officially two have not been sold in New Zealand. One was made especially for the US market and I managed to persuade a US collector friend of mine to part with it. Another was made for the Japanese market. A very few "overrun" export only bottles were sold from the winery in Thames. I have to thank Shirley Kirby for getting the Japanese bottle for me.





FOUR GINS

For no better reason than that I had an extra shot to use up in the camera I have for you four gins.

Over 20 years old now is Westminster Celebrated London Dry. This is in the same tapered clear glass bottle that a number of New Zealand drinks have come in including Larsen Cognac, 007 Cocktails, Royal Viking and Golden Bell Brandies, Long John Scotch, Samovar Vodka and Riccardo Rums. There is a twin Brother to this bottle, Westminster Celebrated Vodka. It is actually the same label with a sticker saying Vodka over the words London Dry Gin. The Extra Dry label is omitted.

Calvert is a well known American brand of gin. I suspect that the bottles were imported from the US as this shape has not appeared with other New Zealand minis. It was bottled in New Zealand under licence by Seagram NZ Ltd., Auckland. The label is a striking blue fading from light in the centre to dark, almost black, on the outside.

The final two gins were produced and bottled by Southern Grain Spirits New Zealand Ltd., Kaiapoi (which is just north of Christchurch). The Coachman was sold commercially and so were 750ml and 1125ml sizes of Gracey's. However, although the labels were prepared the mini was never issued. I found the label in their label store and persuaded them to bottle 120 for the club. The club still has stocks of both Coachman and Gracey's. They are available at \$3.00 each plus postage from Supplies Officer, Dianne Opie, Garsed Road, RD2, Patea, Taranaki.















is what most of the bottles I have for you in this issue of miNiZ say or imply. In the last miNiZ I showed you some of my Jim Beam Commemoratives produced for New Zealand, this time we have a real cross section of "Special" New Zealand Bottles.

The first bottle to show you is Western Moonshine. The label is gold with black writing. This was bottled by Western Hill Lions for 202H Convention 1983.

The Western Hills of the Hutt Valley are home to this Lions club. Leading off the valley is Moonshine Road which connects

with the Moonshine Valley, hence the name. What worries me about this bottle is the wording at the top of the label, "Not recommended for consumption yet."

Also from 1983 is 45th Convention Blend Whisky. This bottle contains 45 South Whisky and was especially bottled for the New Zealand Professional Photographers Association Convention. This convention was in Dunedin, home of Wilsons Whisky who make 45 South. The label has a cream background with a sort of sepia camera and Tripod and brown writing.

One of my favourite NZ bottles, and certainly one of the most original, is Dr. Hearall's Invisible Business Tonic Radio. This bottle was given away in 1981 as an advertising promotion by Radio New Zealand's ZB Network. On the top of the label it states "Proved effective all over the world" and lower down "Apply in liberal doses to improve the well-being of your business." The bottle is the familiar 6 sided one from Seagers Gin, which is what it contains.

Not a commemorative but a straight advertising gimmick is the International Marine Insurance Agency Limited bottle. This plastic bottle was put out about three years ago. It was made by the Coruba Rum Company (Jamaica) Ltd and came in a box that looked like a shipping container (only smaller!). It counts as a New Zealand bottle because it has the Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch addresses and telephone numbers for the company on the label.

Miniature Bottle Festival Imperial Vodka was a very small bottling for a gathering held in Cambridge on 15th November 1987. This was largely organised by members Judy and Gordon Homewood. It is a plain white label with reddy-brown writing.

The next three bottles are all from one company, Pacifica Shipping. The Spirit of Free Enterprise was bottled for the start of a new coastal shipping service linking Lyttleton with Wellington. The ship they used was named the Spirit of Free Enterprise because it was the first such service in many years to compete with the (then) nationalised New Zealand Rail ferries. The label is pale green, the ship and most of the writing in black and the remainder of the writing in a darker green.

We assume that the "Now we are one" bottle, which was made for the venture's first birthday, also contains gin, although nowhere does it say so. This bottle has two labels and it is arguable as to which is meant to be the front and which the back. The label shown is pale blue with a darker blue used for the writing. The other label is the shape of a flower. It is blue in the middle with black writing and red on the outside with black writing.

"Three and still counting... on you" "Pacifica Shipping" is their third anniversary bottle (there was no second anniversary bottle). It is a white label with both the illustration and writing in dark blue. By the colour of the spirit and the shape of the bottle we assume that it contains Wilsons or 45 South whisky. There were no more bottles issued after this one for a very good reason, the Spirit of Free Enterprise went bust! The ship does however still retain the name and now travels among the Pacific Islands. It was docked in Suva on my last visit.


Guardians of Taste Lucky 13 1986 was issued by an Auckland Wine tasting club of the same name. Former member of ours, Frank Wynn, was a member of Guardians also and persuaded them to issue this bottle for their 13th Anniversary. It contains Babich Medium Sherry - not a good choice in my opinion as they claim to be guardians of taste.

Until a few years ago it was a tradition of the (British) Royal Navy to issue a daily rum tot to all members of the crew. The strength of the rum varied with your rank! When the Royal New Zealand Navy became independent of the Royal Navy in 1941 this tradition was kept up. In fact, as it states on a label on the rear of this bottle, the practice did not cease with the RNZN until 1st March 1990 - long after the Royal Navy had stopped the issue. The rum in this miniature, which commemorates the RNZN 50th Anniversary, is rum left over from the "Tot." The rum is full (Officer) strength at 54.5% Alcohol or 95° Proof. The label is blue on gold and the bottle brown.

The last two bottles are club birthday commemoratives. Both are still available if you would like one, as is the RNZN 50th Anniversary bottle as described above (Contact supplies officer Dianne Opie). Unfortunately none of the others are at all common. If you do come across any of them - grab it and don't let go.

The last two bottles are unusual in that both have photos for labels. The photos came from a firm called New Zealand Photo Labels who specialise in producing very thin sticky back photographs. These make a very superior label at an economic price for a short run. The 7 years Itch Ching Liquer was made in 1988, the liquor is not to be recommended. The PNMBC 10 bottle is from 1991. It contains our own brand, Port Nicholson Scotch.

There are more Commemoratives that I do not have in my collection. I will try to get photos of them from other collectors and share them with you another time.



Above are pictured 8 of 32 new ceramics from the Czech Republic. As this country was only formed last year it is safe to assume that all of you out there will not have any minis from this country.

They are made by a firm called Hills which has been in business in Czechoslovakia for over 70 years. Following the overthrow of communist rule the descendants of the original founders of the company re-took ownership of the company in 1990.

There are two series. The three at the back of the photo, starting from the left, and the two at the front are called "Drunkard Heads". They contain Hills Whisky, Rum Sandokan, Gin Extra Fine, Bross Whisky and Apricot Whisky. The three on the right are called "Harem". The tall one is known as "Favourite" and contains Hills Whisky and the other two are known as "Eunuchs" and contain Rum Sandokan and Bross Whisky. All of these are available in four colours, Rusty Brown, Dark Brown, Green and Blue. "Favourite" is 15cm tall and the others 9-11cm tall. All contain 50ml.

These minis are available from Jaroslav Kuba and a complete price list and order form follows on the next two pages.




