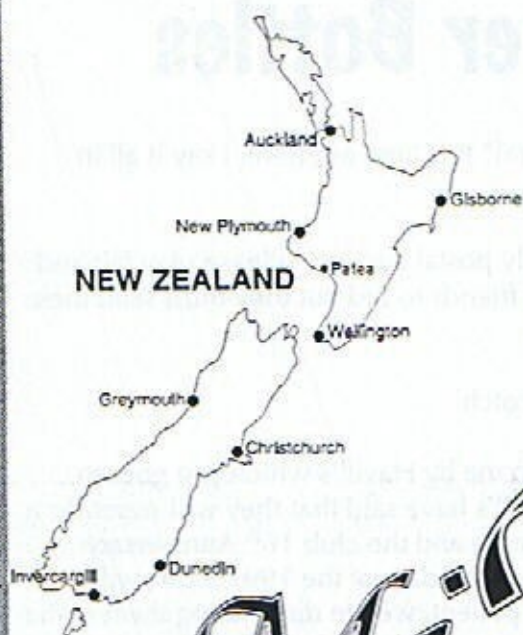
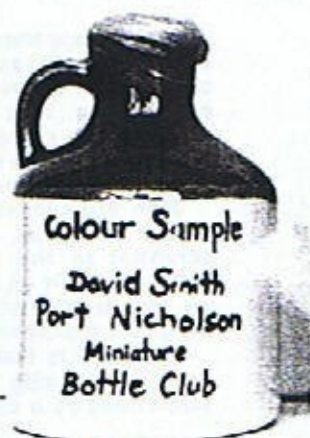

Chemicals in red wine may prevent cancer

This article is from The Times and is the best excuse I have ever found for getting drunk in the pursuit of good health!

RED-WINE drinkers may wish to raise a glass to resveratrol, if they can wrap their loosened tongues around the word.

A natural chemical of that name, in grape skins, has been found to prevent cancer.

Scientists from universities in Chicago and Madrid dosed cancerous rats with the chemical and concluded that it is one of the best natural anti-cancer agents yet discovered.

It appears to block an enzyme that leads to the disease. It is hoped the research could lead to diet supplements based on resveratrol which people could take to

reduce their risks of cancer.

An alternative might be to drink enormous quantities of wine.

However, oenophiles should note that, to achieve the same dosages of resveratrol as given to the laboratory mice, they would need to down 22 litres of red wine a day.

The best source of resveratrol is wine made from the pinot noir grape. Aging tends to deplete the wine of its health-giving properties. Levels are higher in wines

produced in damp, cool, mould-prone climates, such as France, than in the drier regions of California and Australia. Even white and rose wines, from which grape skins are taken at an earlier stage in production, contain appreciable amounts.

The chemical is a flavenoid, one of a group of substances that give wine its colour and flavour, and which also lower cholesterol and reduce the risk of blood clots. Some scientists believe flavenoids can account for the "French paradox" — that the wine-loving, fatty food-eating inhabitants of the Perigord region live long, healthy lives.

Resveratrol was discovered in 1924 and identified in grapes in 1974.

Research published in an issue of *Science* magazine

detailed its apparent ability to block the malignant work of carcinogens. Resveratrol, according to test results, stopped the propagation of tumours and made cancerous cells revert to normal.

John Pezzuto, of the University of Illinois, a senior scientist in the research team, says: "Of all the plants we have tested, this one has the greatest promise."

"My hope is that one day we will be taking a dietary supplement as a cancer pre-

ventative, just like many people now take vitamins."

Resveratrol is also found in nuts, certain tree roots and mulberries, among other fruits.

John Folts, a cancer research scientist at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine, describes the resveratrol research as "an important step forward" but says: "I do not think we should recommend that people eat a lot of grapes to prevent cancer, but the overall message is that fruits and vegetables are very useful against the disease."

Beer in ancient times

Exactly when beer was first brewed cannot be determined. Two slate tablets are displayed in the British Museum in London, which were, in the year 1926, scientifically estimated to be about 9000 years old. The scientist, a Mr. E. Huber, was of the opinion that the inscriptions on these tablets showed the coarse milling of emmer (A prehistoric grain type, similar to spelt, used for the brewing of beer). He concluded that this was possibly the oldest evidence of the brewing of beer. More recent research has indicated that the tablets are probably not so old as Mr. Huber thought and that even the connection with the brewing process may be doubtful.

The oldest proven records of brewing are about 6000 years old and refer to the

Sumarians

Sumaria lay between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers, encompassing Southern Mesopotamia. The Sumarians discovered the fermentation process by chance. Of course, nobody knows today, exactly how this occurred, but it could be that a piece of bread became wet and was simply forgotten. After a short time the bread began to ferment and a inebriating pulp resulted. The Sumarians were able to repeat this process and are assumed to be the first civilized culture to brew beer. They had discovered a "divine drink" which they offered to their gods.



Gilgamesh

From the Gilgamesh Epic, written in the 3rd millennium B.C., we learn that not only bread but also beer were very important. This epic is recognized as one of the first great works of world literature. Ancient oral sagas from the beginning of human history were recorded in writing for the first time. The Gilgamesh Epic describes the evolution from primitive man to "cultured man".

Enkidu, a shaggy, unkempt, almost bestial primitive man, who ate grass and could milk wild animals, wanted to test his strength against Gilgamesh, the demigod-like sovereign. Taking no chances, Gilgamesh sent a whore to Enkidu to learn of his strengths and weaknesses. Enkidu enjoyed a week with her, during which she taught him of civilization:



"(..)Enkidu knew not, what bread was nor how one ate it. He had also not learned to drink beer. The whore opened her mouth and spoke to Enkidu: 'Eat the bread now, O Enkidu, as it belongs to life. Drink also beer, as it is the custom of the land. (..)'" Enkidu drank seven cups of beer and his heart soared. In this condition he washed himself and became a human being.

The Sumarian empire collapsed during the 2nd millennium B.C., hopefully not because of their beer consumption, and the

Babylonians

became the rulers of Mesopotamia. Their culture was derived from that of the Sumarians, and as a consequence of this, they also mastered the art of brewing beer. Today we know that the Babylonians new how to brew 20 different types of beer. Of these, 8 were brewed from pure emmer, 8 from pure barley and 4 from a mixture of grains. In Babylonian times beer was cloudy and unfiltered. The predecessor of the drinking straw was used to avoid getting the brewing residue, which was very bitter, in the mouth. Lager beer was even exported to Egypt, 1000 kilometers away. Hammurabi, an important Babylonian king and empire founder, decreed the oldest known collection of laws. One of these laws established a daily beer ration. This ration was dependent on the social standing of the individual. For example, a normal worker received 2 liters, civil servants 3 liters, and administrators and high priests 5 liters per day. In these ancient times beer was not sold, but exchanged for barley. As beer brewing was a household art, it was women's work. King Hammurabi ordered a female saloonkeeper drowned because she accepted silver for her beer. Drowning was also the punishment for serving low quality beer. The



Egyptians

carried on the tradition of beer brewing. They also used unbaked bread dough for making beer. Peasants along the Nile, the so-called Fellahs, still make beer the same way today. The Egyptians added dates to the brew to improve the taste. The importance of beer brewing in ancient Egypt, can be seen from the fact that the scribes created an extra hieroglyph for "brewer".



After Egypt was succeeded by the Greeks and

Romans

beer continued to be brewed. Plinius reported of the popularity of beer in the Mediterranean area before the growing of grapes for wine took hold. Thereafter, in Rome itself, wine became the drink of the gods (Bacchus). Beer was only brewed in the outer areas of the Roman Empire where wine was difficult to obtain. For the Romans, who almost exclusively drank wine, beer was a horrible barbarian drink. As Tacitus, who first wrote an extensive report about the ancient Germans, the

Teutons

put it: *"To drink, the Teutons have a horrible brew fermented from barley or wheat, a drink which has only a very far removed similarity to wine".*

Beer of that era could not be stored, was cloudy and produced almost no foam.

The oldest proof that beer was brewed on German soil, comes from the early Hallstatt Period (about 800 B.C.). Bier amphora found near the present day Kulmbach have been dated back to this time. A few hundred years after the birth of Christ, beer was a standard commercial article. This was confirmed by the finding of a beer seller's mug near Trier. The ancient Germans regarded beer not only as a sacrifice to the gods but also brewed beer, as in Egypt, for their own enjoyment and it played an important role in their daily lives. For example, in the Finnish poetic saga Kalewala, 400 verses are devoted to beer but only 200 were needed for the creation of the earth. According to the Edda, the great Nordic epic, wine was reserved for the gods, beer belonged to mortals and mead to inhabitants of the realm of the dead. Baking bread and brewing beer were the work of women in the first centuries after the birth of Christ and remained so until the Middle Ages.



Bottles from Fiji

If you think that we haven't shown any bottles from Fiji before you would be right. We have nothing against Fiji it's just that none have been produced, well, almost none.

On the right are shown three of only four that have been made as far as I am aware.

The Harris Port was made especially for the Regent of Fiji Hotel. The hotel is still there but it is no longer the Regent. It is now the Sheraton Royal. When Sheraton took the hotel over they inherited thousands of these Ports and are not sure what to do with them all! Incidentally, the only Fiji bottle missing is also a Harris Port especially bottled for the Regent of Fiji. This has a transfer label. I saw one (empty) but could not obtain it whilst I was valuing the hotel last year. If anybody has one I would be glad to show it in a future miNiZ.



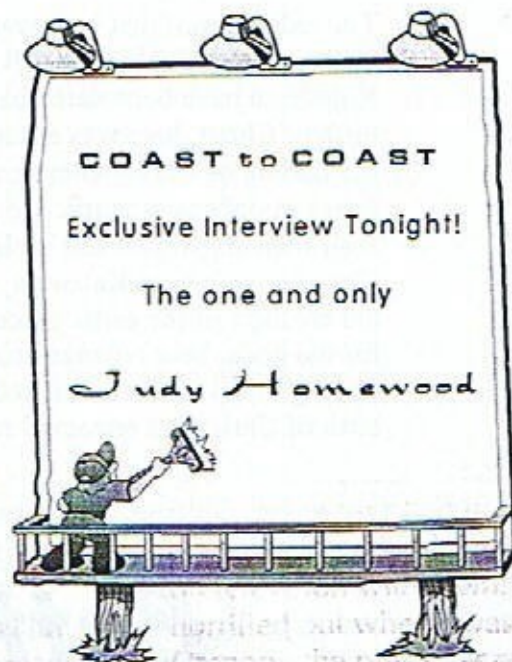
The first Fiji Rum is a glass bottle inside a plastic barrel, similar to a number of scotch bottles. The second is a plastic bottle which I have been told is now available in NZ but I obtained both these rums from the duty free at Nadi airport.

Note that some Fiji rum was bottled in miniature in NZ a few years ago under the Bounty label.

....AND MY THIRTY MINUTES OF INFAMY AND NOTORIETY

For those who do not know Dick, he was a fireman in Waltham, Massachusetts until he retired a few years back. This little tale illustrates the pettiness of Government Officials the world over.

When I was working I used to have all my mail sent to the Fire House as there was usually time whilst I was on standby to read and reply to it. I was at the Fire House a few years ago and received a letter from the Post Office Customs Bureau in Buffalo, New York State. The letter informed me that a parcel addressed to me, with 6 Canadian minis, had been stopped by Customs; and did I not know that it was illegal to send liquor by mail? It informed me that I could pay the duty and either pick up the parcel myself or have someone pick it up for me, and that failing to do so within 30 days would result in the parcel being disposed of.



No offer was made for the parcel to continue on to me by mail if I paid up so I telephoned the lady who wrote the letter. She said "the duty is 31¢ and the fine 47¢" "that's ridiculous" said I, "this phone call is costing more than that and it cannot be worth collecting such a small amount." She hung up.



My Lieutenant read the letter and asked what I intended to do as Buffalo is many miles from where I live. "No problem" I said, "I'll call the Buffalo Fire Department, I'm sure someone there will help me." I placed the call and asked to speak to one of the firemen or maybe a Lieutenant but was put through to the Big Chief. After apologising for wasting his time and explaining what I was after he said "no problem, the Main Post Office is just across the street and besides which, I collect Fire Arm Patches and so know what it's like to be a collector." I also collect patches and so offered to send him some swaps I had accumulated from Hong Kong and England. He offered to get the minis collected for me.

A few minutes later his driver pulled up at the Post Office in his official big red car (licence plate C1) and asked to speak to the lady I had spoken to. She was duly impressed and commented "boy, that Mr. Cotton knows some big people."

The Big Chief re-posed the minis to me and I posted the patches and a refund of the duty and fine.

The above is, of course, just an excuse to show you some Fire Brigade minis.

The Fireman top right on the last page could well represent Dick. It is one of a series of four issued by J.P. van Winkle & Son under the "Old Commonwealth" label as a limited edition set, "Modern Firefighters," in 1982/3. These are some of the nicest ceramics in my collection. The above is entitled "Nozzleman." Shown below are the other three entitled "Modern Firefighter," "Fallen Comrade" and "On Call."



The firefighter's head on the left is definitely not Dick, for two reasons. Firstly because I have met him and this doesn't look a bit like him. And secondly because this is an Argentinian Firefighter by Forcoll. This piece should still be available.

Below are two more favourites of mine. The Seagrave Fire Engine is the second in a series and was issued by Dug Pickings in 1993. Most of you will be familiar with Dug's bottles from his first series, the Nevada Brothels. This bottle is the same excellent quality. This engine was built in 1913 in Columbus Ohio and was originally sold for \$3500 (the real one that is, not the mini - all offers over \$3000 considered for the mini!). It was the first motorised fire engine in Nevada and served in Carson City until 1949. It is now in the Warren Engine Fire Museum in Carson City.

The second mini below is not of a fireman or fire brigade equipment but is very much related. When Dick and his mates fail and something burns to the ground, the Phoenix Bird is said to rise from the ashes. Obviously a metaphor for the renewal that takes place after a disaster. This mini is from Ski Country.

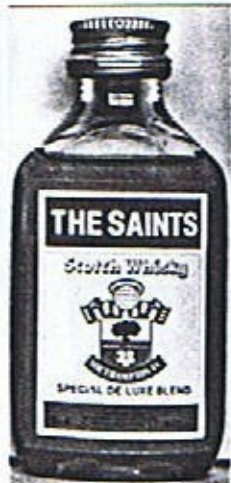
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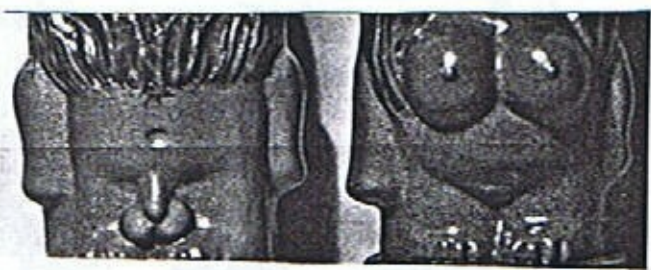
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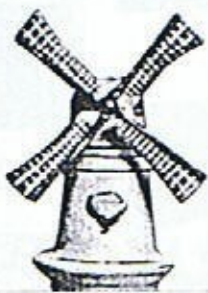

The internet site is worth a visit as it also has a history of each of the vineyards.



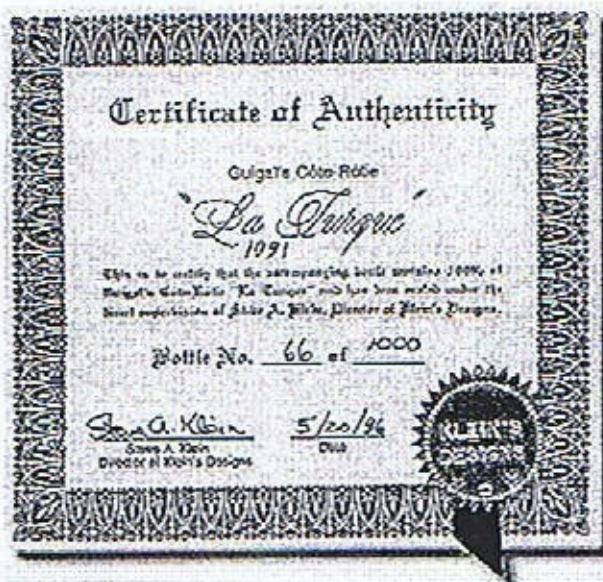

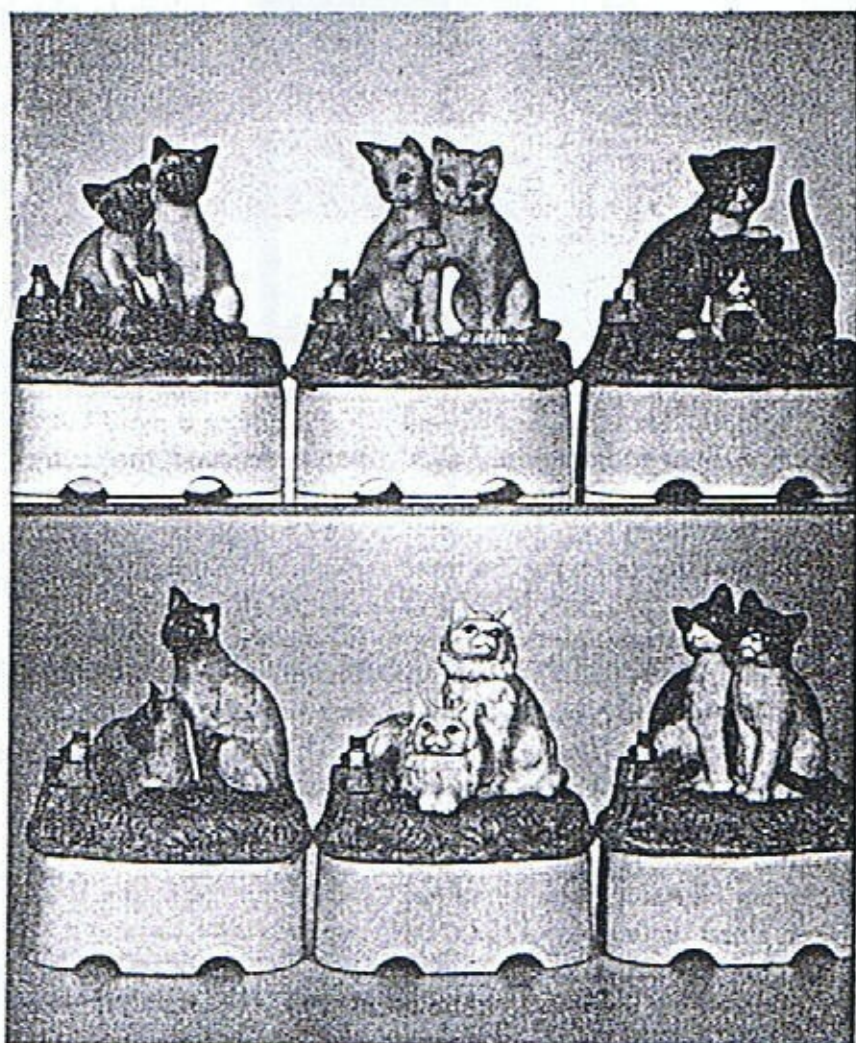

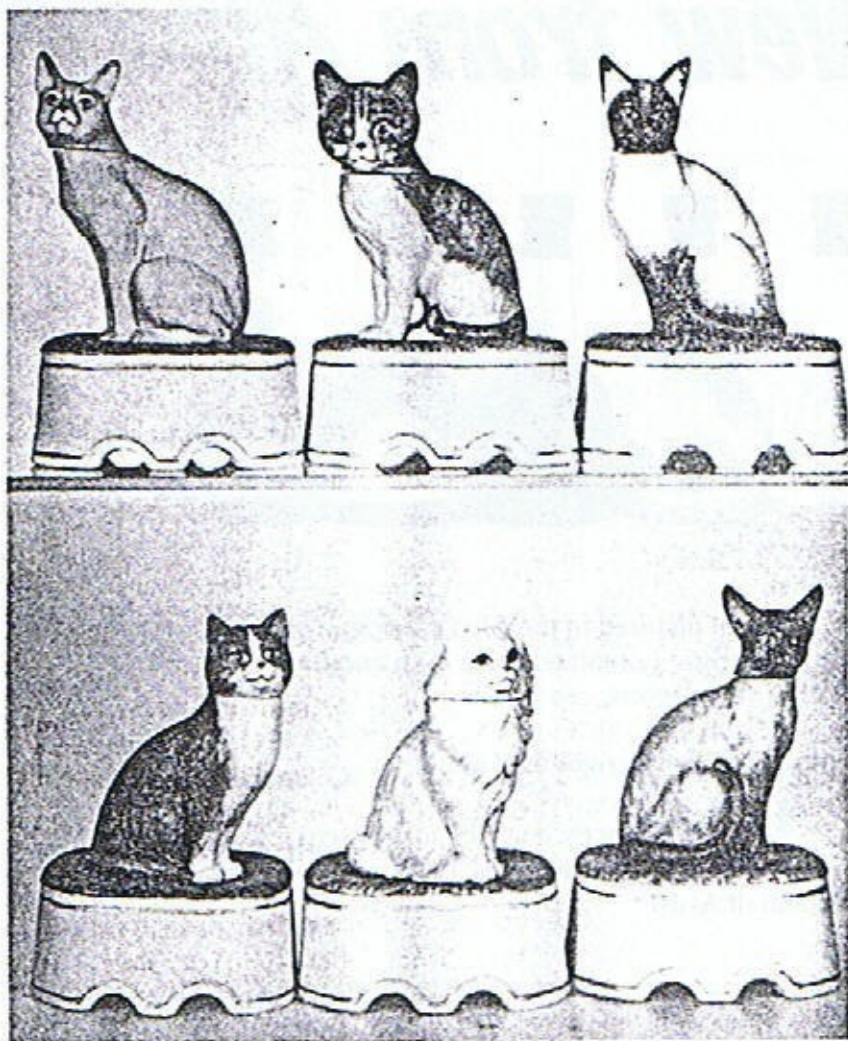

SOUTHERN ALE BREWED TO EUROPEAN TASTE

Named after the winds that howl through the southern oceans, the Roaring Forties brewery on Stewart Island (population: 380) is the southernmost brewery in the world.

About 30km off the South Island across Foveaux Strait, Stewart Island was known in Maori mythology as the anchor stone of Maui's canoe. There are only two hotels on the island, in the main township of Oban, and Roaring Forties beer is sold on tap in both of them.

Lloyd Wilcox, a local tourism operator, set up the brewery as a cottage industry four years ago, producing a distinctive, dark ale which is a winner with the many



German and other European tourists who visit the island each year.

Brewing starts in September and continues into late autumn, with brews of 1000 litres made every 10 or 15 days.



Stewart Island beer baron Lloyd Wilcox at Roaring Forties, the southernmost brewery in the world.

Naturally fermented with no chemical additives, the beer is made using the island's water supply and malt extract from Auckland.

Apart from a brief visit to a boutique brewery in Auckland, and his own experience with home-brew, Wilcox went into the venture as a complete novice. This year, he hopes to expand his market north to Invercargill. "I've always had an interest in beer and trying anything new that came along. What I wanted to make was something a wee bit more distinctive."

Less effervescent than New Zealand beers, Roaring Forties ale is considered by connoisseurs to be more "continental" in style. One food and beverage writer who tasted the brew was so impressed she took samples to a conference at Burton-on-Trent in England — the home of the British brewing industry — where it was, by all accounts, favourably received.

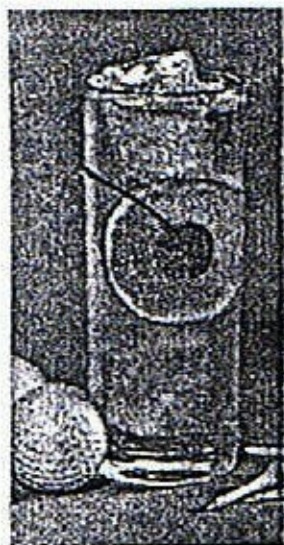
